COUNTY UTILITIES ASSESSED LOWER

Utilities in Marion county were assessed at \$135,629 less this year than in 1931, according to figures released Saturday by Oscar A. Stoeihammer, local assessor. The actual evaluating is made by the state tax commission. Total assessed valuation of all public utilities operating in the county in 1931 was \$8,189,341; for this year it is placed at \$8,054,212. Eight of the major utilities showed decreases; five showed gains. Major utilities and the valuations set are:
