## 12,000,000 POUNDS GRAINS, STOCKS BOTH ADVANCED OF PRUNES SHIPPED DESPITE DEFAULTS IN

In October-November, Most Are 1931 Crop; Foreign **Export** is Largest

A few new-crop dried prunes were shipped in September, but probably 95 per cent of Portland's 2,700,000 pounds shipped by boat in that month represented cleanup of 1931 crop holdings. Similarly, a small fraction of the October loadings represented final old-crop shipments.

Therefor, October-November boat loadings, totaling 12 million pounds, quite closely measures the boat movement of 1932 crop prunes through this port. There is a temporary shortage of eggs here on account of weathtrade leaders and stiffening of quotations is sa grested and in spots higher figures are named. There is a shortage of live hickens showing as a result of low prices and weather conditions.


