## ELEVEN LYNCHINGS REPORTED IN YEAR

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—(AP)—The National association for the advancement of colored people announced Tuesday that its records disclosed reports of 11 lynchings in 1932, compared with 14 in 1931. Two of those named were White, the others negro.

"Satisfaction at this slight progress," said Walter White, secretary, "must be tempered by the knowledge that quasi-legal lynchings, shootings by members of posess, hasty court trials with results virtually dictated by mobs, as in Scottboro, Alabama, are little if any better than open and unshamed mob murder."  
"The lynching spirit remains the focal problem of law enforcement in America."

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## GRAINS RECOIL FROM LOW RECORD OUTSIDE EGGS BRING COMPLAINTS

### Withholding of U. S. Growers Helps to Bring Rallies

CHICAGO, Dec. 28.—(AP)—In a quick recoil from record low prices, grain markets the world over rescued themselves today from the effects of Argentine and Canadian distress selling.

Evidence that United States grain growers were withholding supplies to an unprecedented extent did much to bring about chief domestic rallies. Receipts of wheat at chief domestic centers were shown to have been curtailed today to the smallest total this season and arrivals of corn here were almost nil.

Before the price rallies, however, urgent pressure of Argentine wheat for an outlet in Europe swept the Liverpool distress selling to a fresh historic depth for quotations on wheat future deliveries in Great Britain, with Chicago May and July wheat contracts likewise reaching an all-time record low.

May and July corn, May oats and July rye in Chicago out-did season bottom records.

Wheat closed unchanged at the same as yesterday's finish to 3-8 higher, corn unchanged to 3-8 up, oats 1-8 off to 1-8 advance.
