"They must make sure that the machine does not master man, that it does not fall into the hands of a few ruthless individuals, but that the machine is for the use of all."

Education for use of leisure time was stressed in discussions given at 20 department conferences held during the day.

Dr. Nelson Bossing of the University of Oregon department of education in a talk before the classroom group said that should the present situation continue, "there will be whole counties in Oregon where there will not be an elementary school because the public does not realize the importance of education for its own salvation."

Dr. Bossing criticized bankers and business men for what he described as their opposition to leaders in education attempting to adjust the school systems for "training for tomorrow."

P. Morris, of the economics department of the University of Oregon, said that the public will be forced to support schools because of the urgent need for them.

There are good grounds for belief that the conference resulted in a decision to take no official cognizance of the "hunger march" to view the demonstration, if it is staged, in the same light as the visitation of any other delegation which comes to appear before the legislature, and to leave to the city, county and state police forces the job of preserving order as they would in the performance of their routine duties.

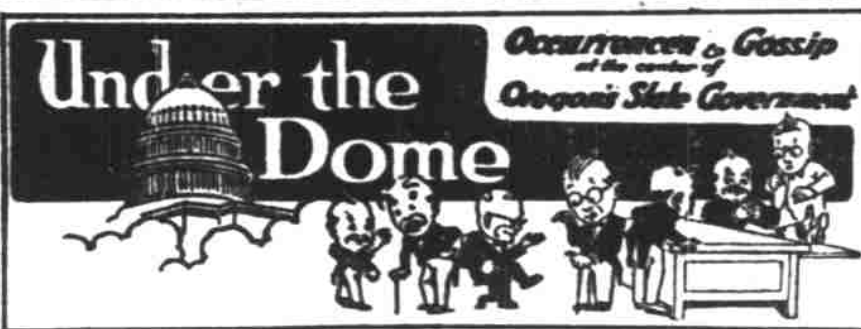

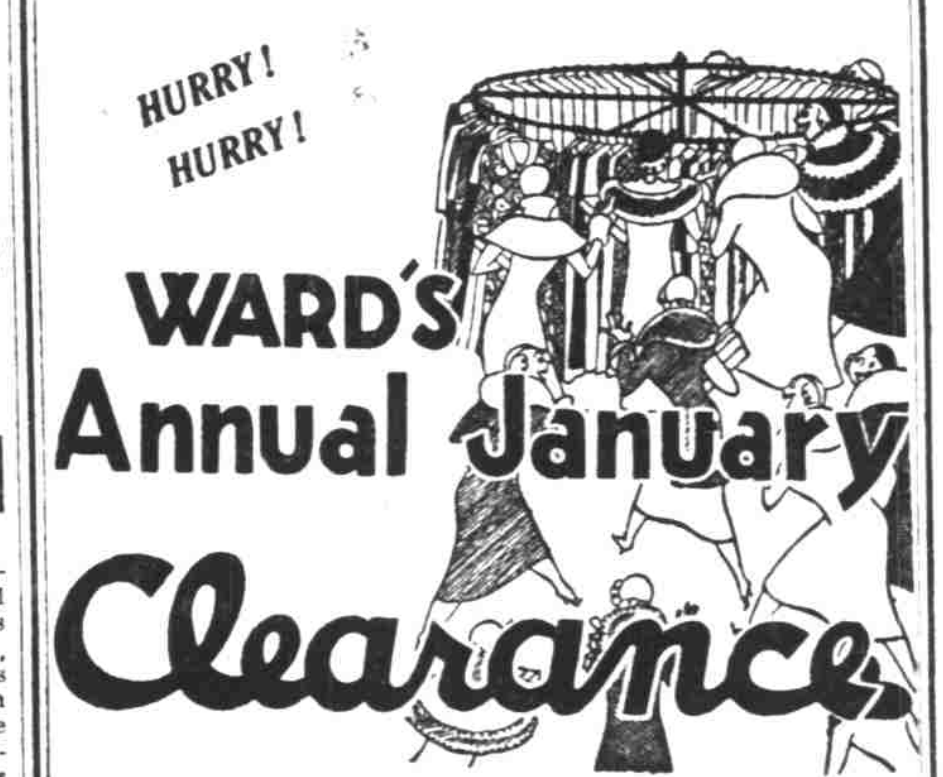
