

IVY RECALLS DAYS OF RIDING RANGES

Says Present Depression Worst, for no Reserve to Carry Through

MONMOUTH, Dec. 29 — James B. Ivy who observed his 72nd birthday anniversary this month, is a native Oregonian, born Dec. 21, 1860 on a farm six miles east of Albany. As a young man he was interested in horses and an outdoor life, and when 23 years old

went to Burns, Harney county and became a buckaroo. Riding the ranges, running horses and cattle was his life's work for more than 30 years.

He says he experienced ups and downs in prices; also prosperous and contrariwise periods in this business, but never one time like the present depression. There was always sufficient income, even in the worst seasons, to carry them through till a change occurred for the better.

Low wages for a workman there, in those days, were \$25 to \$30 per month, with board. Of course there were less men to do the work then, often a shortage of hands being obtainable in haying season, and for the annual driving of beef to a shipping point, Ontario, Baker and Huntington

were the three railway terminals where Mr. Ivy drove his stock. For five seasons he rode broncos every summer himself, and drove beef 145 miles to a shipping point.

Being situated so far from the railroads, and dependent upon every staple commodity shipped in from outside, goods of all sorts were always high in price. It was a fixed condition, however, that the people were prepared to meet, because they had no alternative and knew no other way to live.

Mr. Ivy retired from range life in 1916 and has since made his home in Monmouth with his sister, Mrs. Addie Shore.

STAYTON, Dec. 29 — So many were turned away Sunday night from the pageant at the Christian church, that it is planned to repeat it again Sunday night, Jan-

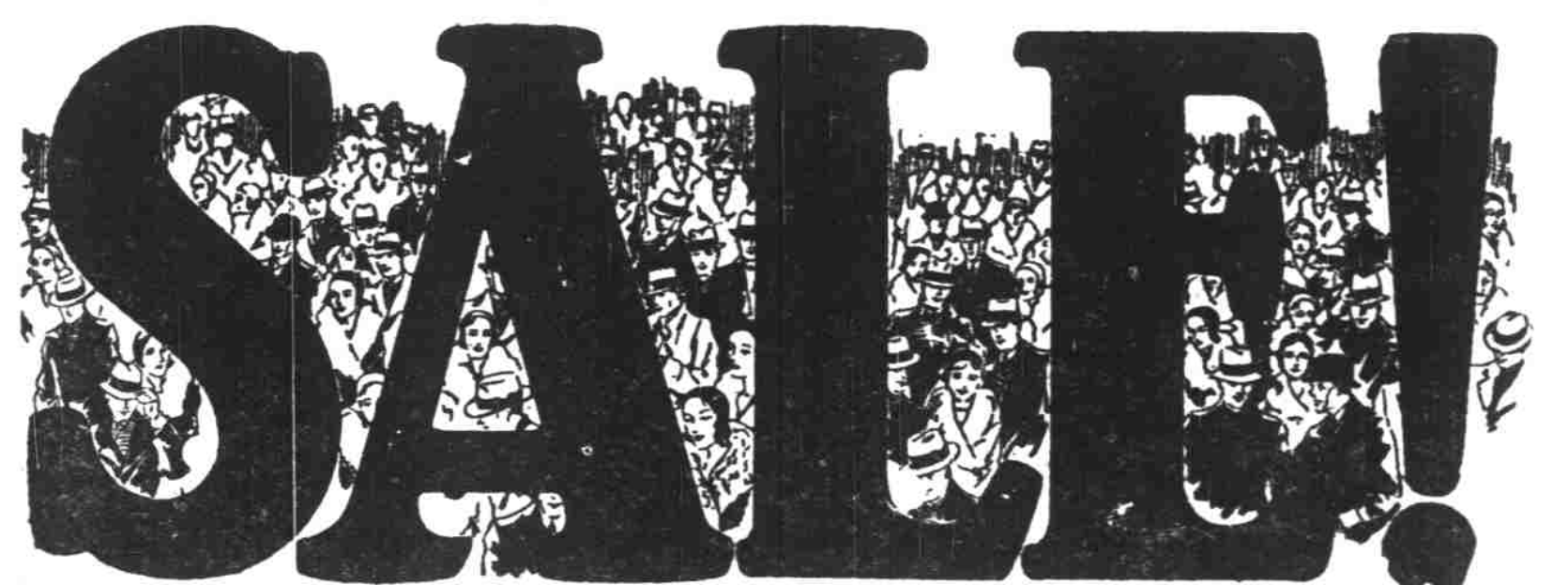

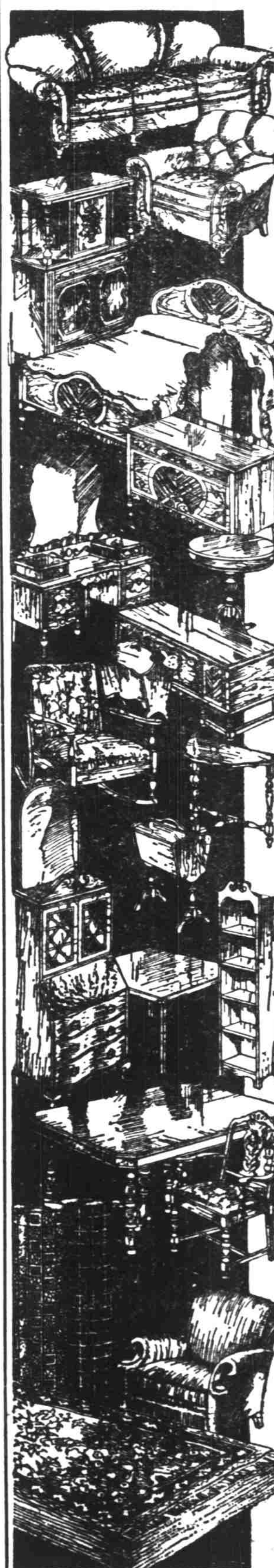
