SANTIAM AREA PLANS HELPED

Chamber of Commerce Also Instrumental Bringing Many Conventions

President Salem Chamber, 1932.
Outstanding in the work of the Salem chamber of commerce during 1932 was the great service to farmers in Marion county, as 124 meetings called by farmers were held in the chamber rooms, with a total attendance of more than 3,800.

Every courtesy was extended to farmers at these meetings and of course, there was no charge for use of the rooms.
Another outstanding feature was the number of conventions held in Salem during 1932, the total number being 23, the majority being state meetings. Of special interest was the filbert and walnut state meeting held in December, attended by 225, held in the chamber rooms.

Plans inaugurated by the chamber to have set aside an extensive district in the Santiam National Forest just south of Mt. Jefferson will make Salem the center for outfitting into the greatest lake and stream fishing district in the northwest.
Primitive Region May Be Set Aside

The chamber sent a delegation into this section, accompanied by national and state forest officials and the result will doubtless be in setting aside this great lake district as a primitive area, which reserves it for sportsmen. More than 50 lakes are in this district, just a few miles away from the North Santiam highway and only a three hour ride from Salem.

Based on an estimate of attendance at meetings held in the chamber rooms during 1932, more than 10,000 have been accommodated and at all these meetings, business attended to was of material benefit to Salem and vicinity. Convenience of rooms at all times for meetings is a service rendered the community of real practical value.

Another service to Salem and Marion county is that of publicity. People are looking towards the northwest and there is a continued daily demand for information about the Salem district.

The booklet, "Come to Oregon," descriptive of Marion county, is regarded by railroad immigration authorities as one of the best county booklets issued in the northwest. Thousands of these are mailed annually in answer to definite requests for information.

Maps and folders
Add to information
In addition to serving as the information and advertising bureau for Salem and vicinity, the chamber issues annually thousands of "Trail 'Em to Salem" maps and folders which are distributed to AAA stations, auto camps and other business organizations to give the tourist some idea of the best route to travel north and south through Oregon. As a result, Salem has maintained its tourist business, as shown by the traffic count of the state highway commission. And the tourist leaves money in Salem. And those attending conventions do the same.

In addition to being the meeting and convention headquarters for Salem and the advertising and information bureau for Salem, there is a daily service to the community to those who arrive in the city and want to know all about our industries and surrounding country. This information is available at the chamber.
For merchants and professional men and those who are interested in people who move to the city and vicinity, the chamber issues monthly a list of newcomers, with addresses. This is a help to chamber members who are looking for new business.

Other activities of the chamber for 1932 include the following:

Women's Clubs of City Look Back On Year of Notable Achievement

Five Nationally Affiliated Groups Cooperate In Program to Bring World Delegates To World's Fair

The year 1932 has been an highly active one for club accomplishments. The need for concerted effort upon programs of relief, the demands of many civic activities which have suffered because of the depression and the great drain upon scholarship funds by students needs during the past several years of economic strain has each contributed its share to a widening field of service for women's club work. And the clubs have risen to the demand in creditable fashion.

Salem clubs have from numerous angles been connected with national programs being initiated by national club groups.

Salem has five nationally affiliated clubs: Salem Garden club, Salem Women's club, American Association of University Women, Business and Professional Women's club and the Zonta club. For the past year these clubs have been working in cooperation with the National Council of Women on a project to secure signatures to a petition to send to foreign governments asking them to send women representatives to the world's fair to be held in Chicago this year 1933.

The women meeting would form an international council and would discuss matters of importance to all women concerned. Salem women have been busy working on their share of the project under the general direction of Mrs. J. N. Devers of the Salem Women's club, into whose hands the responsibility of contacting women's organization fell.

Zontas Assist Girl To Gain Education
The Zonta club, local branch of the national club, has taken upon itself the responsibility of assisting in a material way a girl of Salem high school, whose educational progress otherwise would be badly hindered. Other service programs have been worked on by this organization.

Business and Professional Women's club of Salem is feeling justly proud of the fact that the crowning glory of the year in state club circles is Oregon's record of 13 clubs out of 20 voting 100 per cent at the last election. Miss Helen Louise Crosby is chairman of the state legislative committee.

Relief work has been the outstanding work of the Auxiliary to the American Legion and to the Auxiliary to the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Both these organizations have done exceptional work in this regard.

All clubs have turned more than ordinary attention toward the work of combating results of economic depression, whether it be in relief work or in scholarship aid.

The American Association of University women have given extensive aid to a Salem girl in her school work this year, and the same is true of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Salem Women's club has had an active year under the presidency of Mrs. Hannah Martin.

RELIEF TO BE LEGION'S AIM

Capital Post Wins Pair of Championships; Many Affairs Sponsored

After engaging in more relief work last year than ever before, Capital Post, American legion, will have for its chief aim in 1933 a still greater program of assistance to both war veterans and others. Commander Allan G. Carson stated yesterday. The legion, he said, will seek to cooperate with all relief organizations in this work.

In 1932, Capital post expended about \$2500 in its relief program, according to Adjutant, William Bliven. Waldo Mills was chairman of the service, or relief committee. Final acts of charity were the Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners provided for all persons in need by the Associated Veterans, of which Capital post is a member.

Another aim of the post this year will be to see that the drum corps, judged national champion at Portland last September, goes to the Chicago convention next fall to uphold the honor it has earned. A campaign to this end is in prospect as a statewide affair. The legion has two other national champions in its ranks as a result of competition at the Portland convention: Charles Whittemore, drum major; and the Capital unit auxiliary's vocal trio, Mrs. Grace Zosel, Mrs. Mildred Wyatt and Mrs. Dennis Bowe, with Miss Lena Belle Tartar as director.

Success greeted the legionnaires last year in the two celebrations they staged for the city and surrounding territory. Large crowds participated in the July 4 program at the fairgrounds and in the Armistice day observance and festivities downtown November 11. Both were managed by J. T. Delaney.

Junior baseball will come in for a share of the legion's attention and support again this year, according to Commander Carson.

In 1932, the team placed second in this district. Oliver B. Houston was junior baseball chairman.

Membership in the post, which reached nearly 700 last fall, will be an objective for a vigorous drive this year. The post started in 1919 with 16 charter members.

Last year, under the leadership of Commander Ir. S. McSherry, the post kept within its budget for the first time and paid out largely on its past indebtedness. In former years, resort to borrowing often was necessary, Adjutant Bliven states.

Some of the events that have taken place in the past 12 months may look like the town has gone backward instead of ahead, such as the transfer and consolidation of the Bank of Falls City with the Dallas City bank; also the closing of the Southern Pacific depot, but according to the old adage, "every dark cloud has a silver lining."

The above mentioned facts are just a drop in the bucket in comparison to the uplifting factors that have been at work here. Building has been very slack but a few improvements have been made to some of the public buildings, also bridge repair work has been done.

At present the old Falls City Cannery company buildings are being remodeled by B. F. Emery of Portland, who is a member of the Emery Packing company and has large interests in both Washington and Oregon. He plans to have the plant in readiness for the early spring fruits. This enterprise brings us a home market for small fruits and also furnishes employment to many of the unemployed.

PAPER CONVERTING FIRM KEEPS BUSY

Capacity production was maintained through 1932 by the Western Paper Converting company. This is a specialty products company manufacturing a diverse line of paper products. Its principal market is on the Pacific coast where it has developed a very substantial business. It is a large consumer of glassine and other papers from the local paper mill.

A new line added during the past year is composition books for school and college use. It has kept up its production of candy wrappers, bags, walters' checks, cartons, ruled goods, etc., during the year. One of its large orders

AIRPORT USE MORE EXTENSIVE IN 1932

Passengers Brought Daily; Portions of Field Need New Improvements

A sizeable increase in visitors and transient pilots was noted at Salem municipal airport, southeast of the city, in 1932. Arrival of pilots flying with passengers was a daily occurrence and mail planes often took advantage of the size, lighting and condition of the field for emergency landings during unfavorable weather. The big hangar many times housed the big Boeing and Ford tri-motor planes.

Only because certain portions of the field are not available for flying does the Salem port not have a regulation rating, according to airport attendants. Inspector Marshall Hopkin of the department of commerce, who recently visited Salem, stated that as soon as this deficiency was remedied, the field would be given a standard rating.

The Eyerly Aircraft corporation, of which Lee U. Eyerly is president, has just completed a highly successful year. During 1932, the corporation manufactured 45 acroplanes. Eyerly-designed orientating and amusement device, and sold seven airplanes. Of the 70 flying students enrolled, 53 matriculated during 1932. Corporation officials estimate that they have brought over \$50,000 in business to Salem in the year past.

The Eyerly flying school is claimed the only one in the state having an approved shop certificate issued by the department of commerce and one of three in the Pacific northwest. With the addition of over \$1000 worth of machinery and construction of a 45 by 30 foot reinforced concrete "dope" and paint room adjoining the main building, the factory is able to turn out complete "plane overhauls, including refabricating.

Personnel additions in 1932 include Ben Butler, head of the painting department; H. R. Eyerly, airplane and engine mechanic; and Art Whitaker, plane salesman. Miss Ann Bohrer, office secretary, was appointed airport hostess.

CREDIT GROUP HAS SUCCESSFUL YEAR

New System of Considering Risks Inaugurated by Association Here

The Salem Credit association, under the leadership of President George W. Averitt had a very successful year in 1932. The membership of the association increased from 40 members to over 60. The average attendance increased from 25 to 25.

A new system for the discussion of various individuals was inaugurated whereby the meetings were speeded up, the number of names discussed increased and the information obtained greater. The system has been widely copied throughout the state.

The association helped to establish similar associations in McMinnville, Corvallis, Albany, and Oregon City, going to each of these cities to help in the formation. Each of these towns has copied the Salem form of organization and of conducting their meetings.

Three Banquets Held During Year
The association held three large banquets, entertaining Frank Caldwell, field representative of the National Credit association at the first, entertained for the Oregon association of Retail Credit Bureaus, and held an annual meeting.

The Salem Women's breakfast club, was formed with the assistance of the association.
Through the efforts of this organization together with the cooperation of certain aldermen an ordinance was passed making the giving of a check without sufficient funds in the bank to cover, a vagrancy, thereby decreasing the seriousness of the crime, but making prosecution much easier and desirable. This ordinance has cut the number of bad checks received by the merchants more than half, and has relieved the congested district attorney's office of much work that heretofore came to them.

All Members Belong To National Group
The association has instigated a plan whereby each member of the association will automatically become a member of the National Retail Credit association without the further payment of dues.

Through the efforts of the president and several public spirited members a check float was entered in the "Build Salem" day parade, which brought national recognition to Salem through the publishing of a picture of this float in the Credit World, the National Retail Credit paper.

By making conditions known to Governor Meier and the heads of the state department, the condition of the credit of state employees has been increased greatly and there has been a marked betterment in the paying habits of state employees, due to the cooperation of the governor and the various heads.

Marion County Rather Slighted In Matter of Game Fish Planted

North Fork of Santiam Receives None; 27,000 Rainbows Placed In Main Santiam; Linn County Fares Better

The Oregon Game commission was very liberal to Linn county in 1932 and in fact, more trout were planted last year than in any ten years past.

Of the 632,650 trout planted in 1932, in Marion and Linn counties, a total of 540,600 steelheads were planted in the South Santiam river in Linn county and these weren't little ones. They were from five to 12 inches in length and will make fine fishing when the season opens on April 15, 1933.

Marion county did not receive much consideration from the Oregon Game commission. The main Santiam river received 27,000 rainbow trout from four to six inches in length. When a head up stream it is probably an even break that Marion county streams will benefit half that number.

Abiqua creek in Marion county received 5,000 cutthroats from

three to eight inches long which will furnish fine spring fishing in that neighborhood. Abiqua creek rises in the mountains east of the Silver Falls state park, flows northward just a mile or two north of Silverton and then into the Pudding river.

Silver creek, in the Silver Falls State park district, received 9,200 cutthroats from four to 12 inches long.

The North Fork of the Santiam river received no attention whatever from the Oregon Game commission, but the Little North Fork of the Santiam, which flows into the North Santiam not far from Mehama, received 10,000 rainbows from three to eight inches.

Breitenbach river was favored with 10,000 rainbows and again Abiqua creek came to the front with 10,000 rainbows.

A number of privately owned lakes did fairly well the past year. Angel lake, near Mt. Angel, re-
