Catalo Has Head Turned Salemward

WOODBURN, Jan. 5.—A catalo spent Wednesday afternoon and night in Woodburn. For sake of clarity, a catalo is an animal, which, as its name implies, is a cross between a cow and a buffalo.

A Washington man is touring the Pacific coast with this animal. He hitchhikes his catalo to a light two-wheeled "covered wagon," and goes on a tour of this fair land. He makes expenses by selling pictures of his animal and cart.

The catalo, a four-year old bull, is an enormous animal, weighing 1850 pounds. The massive head, hide and general conformation suggest a buffalo more than a cow. Many stock raisers believe that the catalo will become an important meat animal. Its hide is said to be of great value, also.

HUBBARD, January 7.—Tuesday night a catalo stayed all night in Hubbard and stopped at school for the children to see at the first recess. A catalo is an animal that is a hybrid between buffalo and cattle. The name is taken from both. This catalo is the only black one in existence. It was a huge animal, weighing 1800 pounds. The head and fore part resembled a buffalo while the hind part resembled a bull.

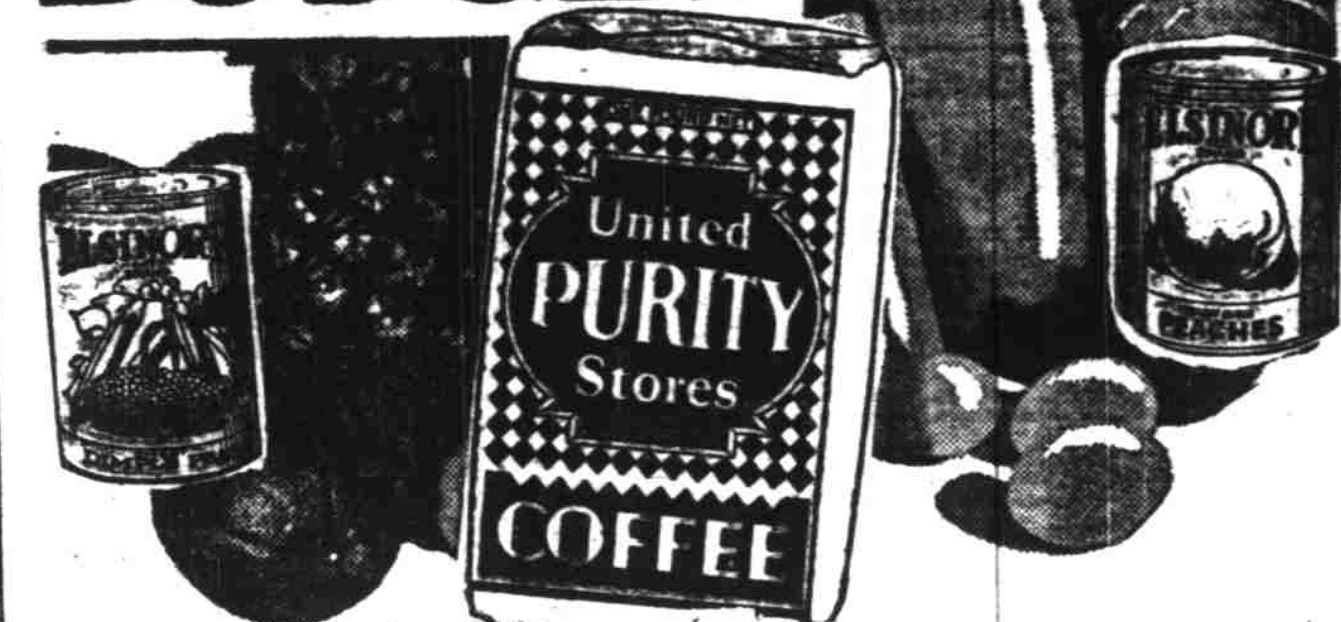
