SUCCESS SEEN FOR POLICE RADIO PLAN

Favorable comment was heard generally throughout the business district yesterday over the proposal to install a short wave radio system for Salem police and sentiment generally was that a policeman's dance would be a good way to finance the installation. Many business men declared that a radio call system for police cars here was needed and should be put in as soon as possible.

Encouraged by the interest, several business men displayed in the plan by coming to police headquarters to talk to him about the radio scheme, Chief Frank Minto last night said he would go ahead at once with plans for the dance. First, he said, accurate estimates and tentative contracts would be obtained from radio firms to show the actual cost of the radio installation, then an early date would be set for the dance and sale of tickets begun.

To obtain speedy action from the federal radio commission on the city's application for a radio station license, Alderman Watson Townsend has written to Senator Charles L. McNary asking him to take up the application personally.
