Spring May See Valsetz Mill Running

VALSETZ, Jan. 6 — Nestled 11,000 feet above sea level in the Coast range mountains is a little mill town, little known to the outside world and up to June, 1931, inhabited by 1500 persons. Now only a few remaining farm owners, as some 25 families are left.

Like many other mill towns Valsetz is not incorporated, so there are no improvements to call for the output of money as many other towns.

The year just past was one of many hardships, but little change in working conditions. However 1,500,000 feet of hemlock logs were shipped to Salem; 12 cars of wood were sawed, split and sent to Salem; as were six cars of lumber.

Building activity here as elsewhere has been slow. Some few improvements have been made including a new decking on the dam across the Silette river, the enlargements of the 7,000,000 gallon reservoir. The jetway shed, machine, and blacksmith shop have all been shingled, also the school house, the entire basement and soup kitchen of the school has been painted.

For the year 1933 nothing is being planned in the way of improvements, however talk has been made that the owner of Cobbe and Mitchell mill plan to start the planing mill in the early spring.

The last year was one of many disappointments, for some 700 mill men and loggers were without work due to the shut down of the lumber mill here. Nevertheless hopes are high that 1933 will bring many changes for the better.

Congregationals Offer Dramatic Service Sunday
The dramatic worship service, "The Feast of Lights," which was presented last year at the First Congregational church will be repeated on Sunday evening at 7:30. It is a matter of interest that this service, which is based upon one of the very oldest liturgies in the Christian church, is being repeated here at the unsolicited request of the Fortnightly club, a group of modern high school young people and is being presented under their auspices and with their assistance.

By the aid of candlelight, symbolism and music it portrays the coming of the Light of the World, the adoration of the Magi and the spread of the Christ Light throughout the nations. A double quartet and chorus will assist with the music.

Stayton Farmers Incorporate at \$10,000 Capital
Move which has been under consideration for several months by farmers of the West Stayton irrigated district came to a head Thursday when articles of incorporation were filed for the West Stayton packing company cooperative, an organization to handle farm products.

The co-operative is capitalized at \$10,000, with 400 shares at par value of \$25 each. Of the total stock, 350 is common and 50 preferred.

GASOLINE TAX FAR BELOW 1931 MARK

Collections from the operation of the gasoline fuels tax law during the first 11 months of 1932 showed a loss of \$593,812.59, when compared with the figures for the corresponding period in 1931.

The gasoline sales from January 1 to November 30 of last year decreased 14,031,149 gallons, while distillate sales of \$73,459 gallons were the smallest since 1919.

The motor vehicle fuel taxes for the first 11 months in 1932 totaled \$3,596,987.68, while receipts from the same source in 1931 were \$6,490,660.48.

November sales of gasoline in Oregon aggregated 11,558,687 gallons, with distillate sales totaling 44,896 gallons. Taxes resulting from these sales returned \$463,918.84 to the state treasurer.

In November, 1931, the gasoline sales totaled 12,055,658 gallons and distillate sales 196,742 gallons. Collections in November, 1931 aggregated \$489,100.36.

SALEM HEALTH WORK PHOTOS GO TO FAIR

Marion county's health department, widely publicized during the five-year demonstration, will receive still greater recognition this year through an exhibit at the Chicago World's fair. At request of the fair management, Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer, recently submitted a series of photographs depicting the department's activities. Word was received yesterday that a dozen of these had been accepted for an exhibit.

The large photos show sections of a children's health parade, school room health inspection and projects, school children drinking milk, baby clinic scenes and two pictures portraying inspection in connection with the uniform city milk grading ordinance.

Grappling for Prowler's Body Is of No Avail

Grappling yesterday proved futile in retrieving the body of the man believed to have drowned in North Mill creek Thursday night after being chased away from the J. B. Chenoweth residence, 609 North 16th street, about which he had been prowling. Walter Gerth of West Salem carefully worked over the creek from 16th street to 12th without success.

Little doubt was held about the man's having escaped from the creek. It is believed the body may either have lodged against the lower dam or have been washed over and into the Willamette river.

Salem Debaters Defeat Gresham High Speakers

The Gresham high school debate squad met defeat at the hands of the Salem high squad yesterday. Gresham upheld the negative and Salem the affirmative of the question, Resolved, That at least 50 per cent of all state and local revenues should be raised from sources other than taxes on tangible property.

Lelan Carter and Vera Schwab, coached by D. E. Dent, composed the out-of-town squad. Robert Read and Laurence Morley, who have been under the tutelage of Shannon Hogue for the past month, made up the Salem squad. Miss Ruth Skinner of Willamette university served as judge.

The next debate of both squads will be Monday, when the Gresham affirmative meets the Salem negative.

ROAD MEN INSPECT FLOOD HAVOC TODAY

County Judge J. C. Siegmund and Engineer Hedda Swart will go to Mehama today to inspect damages done to the market roads there by the floods of earlier this week. A number of reports have come in indicating the roads are in bad shape.

A full week's work is ahead of the commissioners and engineer in inspecting high water damages. Commissioner Jim Smith said yesterday. The water broke through the Broadacres road, residents in that section have reported; repairs are already being made on a bridge at Wacanda, and a bridge near the Jim Linn place is being reconstructed.

Flood damages to the Union Hill county roads are also reported heavy.

Since the position of roadmaster was abolished and Frank Johnson retired the first of the year, Swart has been handling the combined duties of county engineer and roadmaster.
