

# Willamette vs. Multnomah, Salem vs. Silverton Tonight

## BEARCATS LOSE TO GLADSTONE

Black Hawks Hawk Ball to Win 28-24 Though W. U. Tops Field Scoring

Willamette university's basketball team will close its pre-conference series of games tonight meeting the Multnomah club quintet of Portland on the home floor at 8 o'clock. Multnomah will bring such stars as Billy Keenan, ex-Webfoot; George Seales, a former Bearcat; King Bailey, another noted collegian; Ray Smith and Belmer.

The Gladstone Black Hawks, who lived up to their name in hawking the ball, defeated the Bearcats 28 to 24 Friday night, mainly through ability to convert free throws as they attained 19 points in this manner to Willamette's four while Willamette was one field goal to the good.

It was an exciting contest, nip-and-tuck through the first half which ended with Willamette ahead 15 to 12; the Black Hawks moved into a substantial lead, 24 to 19 at one time, and then the Bearcats with a spirited rally caught up at 24-all. Kaiser and Frantz scored the points that brought the teams up to even terms.

Erven Kloosters, former Willamette player, took the points that decided the contest and E. Cranor poked in another field goal that wasn't needed. Kloosters, however, was guarded closely throughout the game and got only two field goals. The three Cranor boys were as fast as ever, with two of them usually smoothing the way for the team to score; but they did not shoot as accurately as in the amateur tournament here last spring.

**Leave Big Opening For Rapid Attack**

The Black Hawks' one weakness was consistent failure to protect against a fast break; Willamette got a number of points for this reason and would have had more if its fast break had been functioning better. The collegians were bothered greatly by the Hawks' habit of checking all the way down the floor.

From the standpoint of the Bearcats' development, in preparation for conference games beginning next week, the improvement in the work of the front and back ends of the basket was most noticeable, though they were so closely covered that they got few points.

## Yew Park Beats Aumsville Quint With Rare Rally

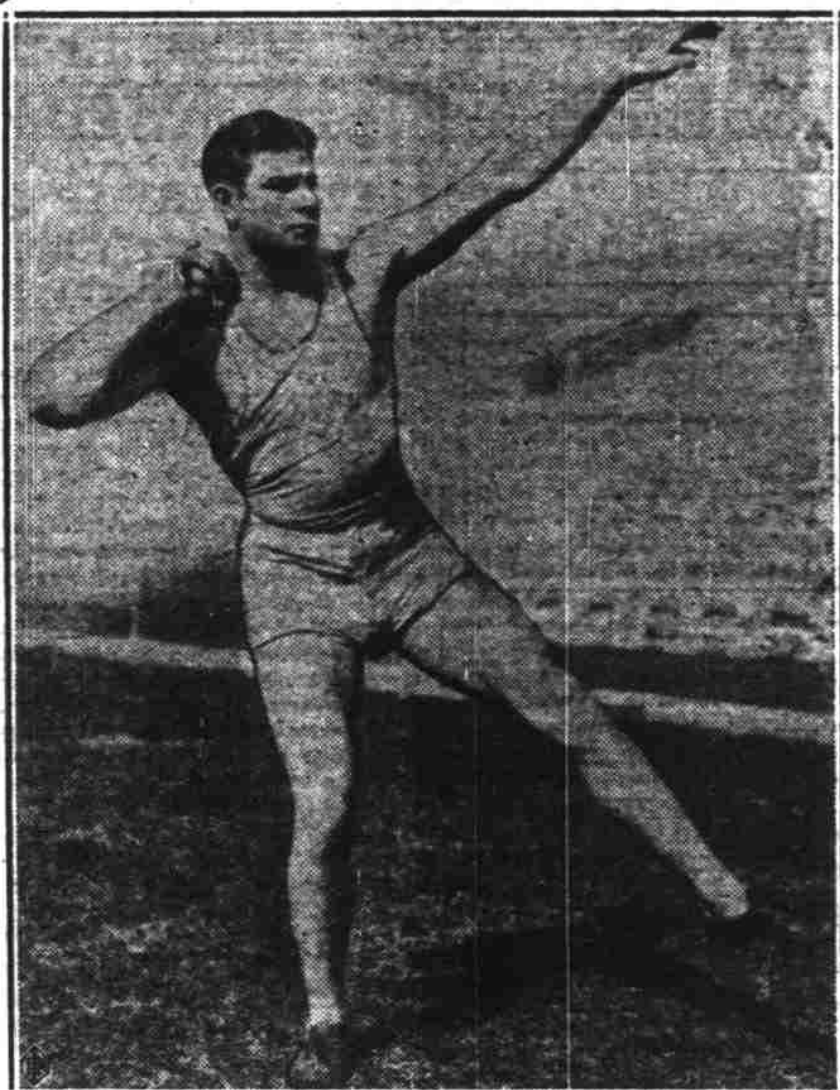

## Beavers Defeat Cougars in Conference Debut 25 to 22; Sons Hold Jinx on Webfeet

PULLMAN, Wash., Jan. 6.—(AP)—Captain Ed Lewis piloted his Oregon State college basketball team to a 25 to 22 victory over Washington State college in the opening game of the Northern division on the Pacific coast conference here tonight.

The towering center gathered six field goals for 12 points to pave the way for the Beaver victory. Washington State's casing was erratic, with only one player, Roland Johnson, sophomore forward, showing consistent scoring skill. He counted ten points. Lewis dropped three goals at the start to give his team a substantial lead. Midway in the first period, Kenneth Willis, Washington State guard, tied the count at eight with a field goal from the corner. Johnson put the Cougars ahead with a free throw, but Oregon State was leading at half time 12 to 11.

Soon after the second period opened, Washington State went into a 19 to 14 lead, but a terrific rally by the Beavers gave them victory.

## VISITING SQUAD OFFERS THREAT

Silver Foxes Have Veteran Crew of Tall Boys and Promise Trouble

Salem high school's basketball team is facing a real threat when it clashes with the Silverton high quintet on the local floor at 8 o'clock tonight.

Silverton high is a much smaller institution, but it takes only five boys to make up a basketball team. Last year Silverton had a notably successful season, winning the county A league title and the district tournament, thus winning the right to represent its district in the state tournament.

In the big tournament, Silverton bumped up against Corvallis in its first game and gave that strong team a tight battle for one half, but lost ground rapidly in the second half and was defeated 35 to 18. Silverton was at a disadvantage in that game because its percentage style of ball was familiar to the Corvallis boys, who employed the same tactics but were a trifle faster.

Made Good Showing Later in Tourney

Later in the tournament Silverton beat Oregon City 27 to 25 in a hair-raising game and held the strong Marshfield quintet to 18-14. Silverton's record so far this year has also been notable.

In contrast to Salem high which is building a new combination this year Silverton has most of its 1933 quintet intact, with Scott and Kohn at forwards and Pettijohn at center. Marx and Orrison are the guards. Marx is the only regular who did not participate in the tournament here last March.

Salem high will be at a disadvantage tonight in the matter of size as well as experience. Scott and Pettijohn are well over six feet tall and the other Silverton players are no pygmies.

Coch Coach Hollis Huntington will probably use the same players who figured in the Corvallis game though he is not yet certain which of two pairs of forwards are more effective. The wall over six feet absent from practice several days this week due to an injured hand, but may play tonight.

There will be a preliminary game between the B teams of the two schools at 7 o'clock.

## CURT COMMENTS

One of the points in report of Jonathan Butler on conditions in the Pacific Coast conference which will cause most persons to guffaw heartily up their sleeves, or right out in the open, is the statement with regard to summer baseball. Butler says he received no report that any conference athlete violated the conference rules by playing summer baseball for money in the summer of 1932.

Four athletes now in conference schools were claimed to have played baseball for money; in one case this was found true and the athlete was disqualified. Two had played on amateur teams and did not violate the rule, one did not play baseball at all and the allegation was a case of mistaken identity.

"Hokey" will be the general response to such a report; though it is just possible that there wasn't any money in summer baseball last year, as that. A few years ago, we feel safe in saying, there was no college athlete in the northwest who had any baseball ability, who did not play ball and take money for it.

We have seen hard cash handed out to ball players who represented schools in the Coast conference. That however, was at a time when there was a "gentlemen's agreement" in the conference that no objection would be made to such practices. That agreement was tacitly abrogated a little over a year ago in connection with consideration of the Lillard case.

Don't get the idea that we personally begrudge an athlete any small amount he can earn playing semi-pro baseball. Our opinion is that it is perfectly proper, and we regretted the conference action forbidding it. The joint we are making is that, if his report on summer baseball is a sample of the thoroughness of all Mr. Butler's investigations, it leaves much to be desired.

Mr. Butler does, however, make one extremely common-sense statement:

"Our present amateur code is largely a development of the English idea of amateurism, which have evolved from conditions that have prevailed at the older English universities where the enrollment is made up of scholars who do not have to earn a livelihood during the years they are engaged in study. So foreign to conditions which prevail in American universities that an ideal code of athletic practices for one is not adaptable to university life at the other."

Elsewhere he pointed out that because of certain loopholes in the conference regulations, "athletes are able to represent a university in athletics for four years and yet have made less than two years progress toward graduation."

Mr. Butler found that six conference schools had been represented by athletes who were ineligible because they had played out their quota of years; these cases were mostly those of athletes who transferred from other colleges, and the oversight, he opines, was due to laxity in keeping participation records.

It's all okeh with us what they do, except as the question of fairness and honesty enters in. If one college is holding to high levels of amateurism and eligibility and others are lax, then there is unfairness; which Mr. Butler declares does exist. "There is no common understanding among the members as to what are legitimate sides that may be extended to athletes. Uneven competitive conditions have resulted from this lack of uniformity."

Despite Mr. Butler's whitewashing, qualified by his remarks as to the aid given by individual "athletic authorities," the general impression will remain that most of the star athletes, if not most of all athletes engaging in intercollegiate competition, receive some help for which they render no compensating service; whether at Oregon where scholarships for athletes exclusively are given openly, or at other colleges where things are done surreptitiously. Oregon fans will never be convinced that this state's outstanding high school football star went to a California school, solely out of admiration for that school or its admittedly famous coach.

And so we conclude, if these things must be done, let's have them done openly, so the athletes will not be parties to a monstrous fraud; and uniformly, so that the competition will be fair.

The Goose was apparently never really happy at St. Louis, although he was well treated by the club, and next season he may be his old self again, back with his old cronies at Washington.

Goslin is a colorful diamond personality, and the Washington fans are rooting for him to come through in 1935 with another of his great batting years.

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
