# MRS. SARAH HARDIN DIES, GRANT COUNTY

News of the death of Mrs. Sarah Hardin, pioneer of Grant county, was received in Salem yesterday.

Mrs. Hardin located in Grant county in 1869, being a member of a party headed by Emanuel Moser of Missouri. The trip from Boise, Idaho, was made by mule team by way of Yale, Gow valley and Summit Prairie. The caravan first stopped in Grant county at the famous Blue Mountain Springs, but later continued to John Day.

Mrs. Hardin was married in the early '70s at Canyon City and had resided at near Mount Vernon continuously since that time. She was in Canyon City during the Indian war of 1878, and was prominent in the activities of Grant county during her lifetime.

Surviving are one son, Loren Hardin, an oil engineer, Mrs. Noel Lemon, and a large number of grand and great-grand children. Mrs. Hardin died many years ago. Funeral services for Mrs. Hardin were held in Grant county.

# PIONEER OF 1845 CALLED BY DEATH

## Funeral Services for Wiley Norton, 88, Will be Held Today

**MONMOUTH, Jan. 9**—Wiley Norton, 88, prominent pioneer of 1845, died Sunday at the family home near Lewisville after a long illness. He was born March 29, 1844 in St. Charles county, Mo. The next year his parents crossed the plains to Oregon. They arrived at Lytton on the Willamette river, Nov. 1, 1845, after taking Meek's cut-off from Fort Boisen across the Cascade mountains. One hundred and fifty immigrants from the large train took the short cut, suffering many hardships and fatalities, and arrived six weeks behind the main train.

In the spring the father, Lucius C. Norton took up a homestead in Kings Valley, Ore. Mrs. Ashnah Plunkett, 86, a sister of Mr. Norton, was the first white child in that section. At the age of 21, Mr. Norton took a homestead in Blodgett valley, toward the coast, and settled there with his bride, Nancy Ann Zumwalt Norton. It was their home for more than 40 years. Except for a few months spent in the mines of Boise, Idaho, he has lived continuously in this part of the west. Mrs. Norton died a few years ago. Surviving are a daughter, Serena, at home, and five sons: Arthur at home, Warren and James Emmet of Kent, Ore., Le Roy and Walter of Hoskins.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday at 2 p. m. at the family home with Rev. H. Charles Dunsmore officiating. Burial in Kings Valley cemetery. Arrangements in charge of Keeney Funeral home of Independence.
