LOCAL EGG PRICES DROP ONE CENT

Notable Setback is Result of Stop Loss Report

CHICAGO, Jan. 9-(AP)-Disquieted by reports of stop loss selling at Winnipeg and by apparent exhaustion of aggressive buying in Chicago, grain markets underwent a notable setback today. Downturns came after wheat here and at Liverpool had mounted to the highest levels in nearly two months, with the Chicago market showing 6 1-4 cents a bushel almost vertical climb of late. Much of today's selling of wheat was associated with the belief expressed by trade experts that reactions were to be looked for after such a steep movement
