Two Lives, Perhaps More,
Lost, Property Damage
Runs Over Million

In the Signal Hill, Huntington Beach and Richfield Petroleum districts, scores of oil derricks, many of them working on active wells, were bowled over. One fell on a house but the family, fortunately, escaped without injury. Another carried a high tension wire to the ground and it crossed a crude oil tank, exploding the derrick and a velocity of 80 miles an hour.

300 Oil Derricks
Are Blown Down
More than 300 oil derricks were blown down in southern California oil fields, mostly in the Long Beach and Anaheim sections.

Damage to the citrus crop from broken trees and limbs and damaged fruit was estimated variously from three to 10 per cent in the localities affected, but no actual monetary estimate could be obtained tonight.

Roots were blown off several small houses and fires were caused by wrecked power wires. Among the wrecked craft were a naval officers' barge, valued at \$12,000 and the racing cruiser, Marlin, a \$10,000 vessel. The luxurious yacht, Talayaha, owned by Lazard Lippman, sportsman, was pounded ashore at Cabo delo beach and believed to have contents starting a fire which spread to another tank before it was extinguished.

Highways were blocked to traffic by the shattered derricks, and for several hours broken telephones, lines brought all communication between here and San Diego to a standstill.

In the Valencia orange district near Anaheim, considerable damage was reported to citrus crops, fruit being blown from the trees, which also were damaged.

RELIEF LEGISLATION DEFERRED ONE WEEK

Definite approval of any legislation dealing with the unemployment situation in Oregon will be deferred pending a public hearing to be held late next week. This was determined at a meeting of the joint unemployment committees of the senate and house yesterday.

Two bills already are before the committee. One of these, by Senator Spaulding, provides that \$10,000,000 shall be borrowed from the Reconstruction Finance corporation to be loaned to employers in agricultural and industrial lines. The money would be used in paying wages.

The other bill, by Senator Lee, provides for a "back to the land movement". This bill creates a commission which would allocate lands reclaimed by the state and counties through tax foreclosures to the unemployed.

JUDGE STADTER TO TALK ON Y PROGRAM

A program of particular interest to out-doo, enthusiasts will be given at the Y. M. C. A. lobby Friday night, when Judge Stadter, accompanied by Ray Conway, both of Portland, will be featured as speaker of the evening. Conway will also speak.

Both men, active in the Mazama lodge of Portland, have accompanied hiking expeditions to most of the high mountains in Oregon. Moving pictures taken on these trips will be shown Friday night with Dr. David B. Hill operating the projector.

Judge Stadter was for three years president of the Mazama group and was one of the pioneers in sports on Mount Hood. Conway is secretary of the Oregon State Motor association.

Program will start at 8 o'clock with H. B. Glaisyer, secretary of the state highway commission, presiding.

Orville Mohler To Join Angels; Father Ex-Star

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 11. —(AP)—Orville Mohler, a white quarterback of the University of Southern California football team, signed a baseball contract today with the Los Angeles club of the Pacific Coast league. Mohler will go out for the season's Trojan nine and he graduated from the university in June. He then will join the Angels at their San Bernardino training camp.

He has played three seasons on the Trojan varsity nine, batting .416, .500 and .396, playing shortstop.

His father "Kid" Mohler was one of the old Coast league players of note. Years ago the latter was manager of the San Francisco Seals.

He was a left handed second baseman.

FINANCIAL CONTROL BILL IS PROPOSED

State Boards Would Place
Revenues in General
Fund is Plan

Before any state board and commission may receive any finances they must come to the legislature for their appropriations and their revenues shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund under the provisions of a bill introduced in the legislature yesterday by Representative Donald J. Ryan, of Clackamas county. The act would except the state highway commission, industrial accident commission, state land board or money derived from the issuance of automobile licenses.

Designation of the so called Yellowstone cutoff as a state highway is asked in a bill bearing the names of Representative W. B. Snider, of Deschutes and Lake counties, and W. E. Stockdale, of Grant and Harney counties. The highway begins at Valley Falls in Lake county and extends by way of Alkali lake and Wagonite to a junction with the central Oregon highway near the Okerman ranch in Harney county and that highway beginning at Burns and extending to John Day.

Payment of \$20 bounty for a cougar and \$30 for a wolf by the state game commission is asked by Representatives E. F. Nichols and A. G. Clarke, of Douglas county. The money would be paid from the commission funds. Amendment of the code to permit non-profit cooperative associations to operate with a board of three directors instead of five as now required by law is sought by Representative G. P. Winslow, of Tillamook county.

SILVERTON GIRL IS WITNESS IN COURT

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 11. —(AP)—The state's case against Jesse Cousins, 48, charged with first degree murder in connection with the fatal shooting of E. B. Viasich of Tacoma, federal prohibition agent, drew toward a close today with the testimony of Louis Cousins, Jesse's brother, and with the disclosure that Harold Cousins disappeared shortly after the arrest of the accused man, his uncle, in which he was charged by police with a leading part.

Louis Cousins testified that he and Vivian Wilson, then a neighbor girl but now living at Silverton, Ore., went to Portland on the afternoon of September 29, and returned to the Cousins farm near Probstville, Wash., between 7 and 7:30 p.m. shortly after the shooting had occurred that resulted in the death of Viasich, fellow agent.

Miss Wilson remained in the house, he said. While he was changing his clothes Jesse came in and told him there had been some shooting going on and he was going to leave the place. Louis testified. Louis came back in the car and returned to Portland with Miss Wilson, not returning to the farm until 1 a.m., he said.

His testimony concerning the time of his arrivals and departure from the ranch was corroborated by Miss Wilson.

Resolution for Consolidation of Counties Planned
Senator Woodward is preparing a resolution authorizing the consolidation of counties, he announced yesterday. No mention will be made in the resolution of the counties that would be consolidated. Woodward said this would be left to a special committee for investigation.

"County consolidation in Oregon would result in a huge saving," Woodward declared, "without disturbing our present form of government."

The resolution will be presented to the ways and means committee.

Incidents and Personalities
More or Less Connected With
the State Legislature and Its
Achievements

JOHN LANG of Haines is the most picturesque man in the lower house. He never wears a tie, he seldom makes a speech, he wanders around outside the coterie of old friends who meet now as legislators. Lang won the democratic nomination in Baker county without trying; his friends wrote in his name. When he campaigned in the November election his speech was short: "I didn't seek this office. I don't ask your vote now. You can do just as you please. All I've got to say is that I'm for the 'good' man." Lang modestly declared. The night before election he waxed loquacious. "Someone has said I don't read," Lang declared. "Well I read three daily newspapers thoroughly. I don't read much other material except I have writings by Plato, Aristotle and Sir Francis Bacon. Who is writing any better than Bacon today?"

Members of the state police were gathered Monday afternoon at the Salem armory ready to rush to the statehouse on the slightest notice. Plans were all in readiness to clear the statehouse of "hunger marchers" if the case developed. However the army of unemployed was as docile as Methodists at a picnic and better organized than most college cheer sections. Thus far the state police department has never been used for riot or mob duty. Its work has been confined to straight law enforcement. Objections raised in 1931 that the state police have would be strike breakers, armed guards of capital, have not proved true. Incidentally a "hunger army" of 200 invaded the statehouse Tuesday, and the statehouse there was heavily guarded. Marching to capitals is now the rage along with backgammon, technocracy and street-corner oratory.

Legislators and clerks joined yesterday in a rush to the secretary of state's office where warrants were ready for last week's work. Delay in signing the \$10,000 appropriation bill passed Saturday had held up the work. One clerk said he was so hard up he had to draw the few dollars of his savings account from the bank in order to live.

House Bills Introduced

H. B. 7.—By Snider and Stockdale. To designate certain highways in Lake, Harney and Grant counties as "state highways." They are Valley Falls-Central Oregon highway junction; Burns-John Day highway.

H. B. 8.—By Nichols and Clarke. To amend section 35-603. To provide for bonds on cougar and wolf. Directing restoration of bounties on cougars and wolves, \$20 and \$30.

H. B. 11.—By Scott. Designating time in which sheriff shall issue deed on sale of real property in tax foreclosure lien sales, and forfeitures of delinquency hereafter issued.

H. B. 12.—By Scott. Relating to interest and penalties on delinquent taxes.

H. B. 13.—By Weatherford. To provide a seed law on crops.

H. B. 14.—By Paulsen. Relating to persons not qualified to act as executor or administrator.

H. B. 15.—By Paulsen. Relating to certain disqualifying presumptions.

H. B. 16.—By Paulsen. Relating to and defining the term "in the forcible entry and detainer statute."

H. B. 17.—By ways and means committee. Appropriating \$10,000 for legislative assembly.

H. B. 18.—By Hilton. Relating to taxing public utilities without franchise.

H. B. 19.—By Dickson and Senator Dickson. Relating to licensing and regulating the business of "machine law" in the amounts of \$300 or less. Reducing interest rates to 1 per cent.

Gus Moser, old warhorse of the senate, was a visitor this week, radiant, chubby as ever. Moser had his faults; was known as an "interests" man and admitted it, but he was forceful, keen, a first-rate parliamentarian. His presence is missed in the senate.

Not a few legislators—most of whom are people of considerable whym—were irked that they were not included in the various calls to the executive chambers yesterday. On the whole Oregon's legislators are like Washington congressmen; they have their sore spots and private peevishness. Senator Burke, for example, wears under real or fancied slights received in the last 18 months under the Meier administration and now is off the reservation.

Students of state government are decidedly in a minority at the capital. Not one person in ten can explain fully the six per cent limitation clause of the constitution, the provision that a levy must be made to meet the deficit, taxes levied inside and outside the six per cent limitation and the various millages imposed by the people and the legislature. The result is any number of suggestions, plans, schemes which are utterly unconstitutional and impossible. A two weeks' study of state government and the fundamental laws concerning it would be helpful to the average legislator.

Six senators were reported absent because of illness yesterday. They are Harry Corbett and Allyn Byrnes of Portland, George W. Duan of Ashland, L. L. Mann of Bend, Lina H. Jones of Oregon City, and Clyde M. Williams of Albany. Two representatives also were still absent because of illness and injuries. They are Dorris E. Keasey of Portland and Teunis J. Wyers, Hood River, the latter in the hospital because of injuries in an auto accident several weeks ago.

CREDIT MEN BACK STATE LUXURY TAX

The Salem Retail Credit association yesterday went on record in support of the luxury tax which Hannah Martin of the Marion county representatives proposes to introduce in the legislature. The credit men opposed the sales tax proposed last week.

Mrs. Martin appeared before the group yesterday noon to present salient features of the luxury tax plan, which includes a 10 per cent tax on tobacco, cosmetics and mail.

This is not a penalty tax on these three items, but a proposition to protect the people from the necessity of a general sales tax or a property tax," Mrs. Martin declared, adding that some additional tax is necessary, but also expressing her own desire to toward reduction of state expenses.

The estimated revenue would be \$1,000,000 annually, and the tax would be collected through a stamp.

Parity Plan for Farm Relief Has Support of F. R.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11. —(AP)—Problems at home, principally the farm relief question, were put under the microscope today by President-elect Roosevelt in a long series of conferences.

Making it clear that he endorsed the principle of the "parity plan" agriculture bill pending in the house, Mr. Roosevelt talked over this issue and governmental economy with Henry J. Harrison, president of the chamber of commerce of the United States.

CHANGES IN INCOME TAX NOW APPARENT

Federal Exemptions Lower;
Failure to get Blank
Held no Excuse

Several changes in the 1932 federal income revenue law are apparent as collections for the year are getting under way. Under the 1932 law, on which the collection deadline without penalty is March 15, 1933, personal exemption for a single man is \$1,000; and for a married man, \$2,500. Under the 1931 act, single men carried \$1,500 exemptions; and married, \$3,500.

Failure to receive a blank form for making a report will likely be the alibi after March 15 of hundreds of men and women, but that excuse will not count according to word sent out to all deputy collectors from Clyde G. Huntley, collector, district of Oregon with headquarters at Portland.

Under the new law, thousands of men and women will be added to the ranks of income taxpayers, but these will receive no notification from the revenue collectors. Blanks are now being mailed, but only to parties who have filed a report in previous years.

Blank forms may be secured from Huntley's office at the custom house in Portland; from Deputy Collector Paul A. Hauser at the Salem postoffice; or from any other zone office.

The tax under the 1932 act, now collectable, is 4 per cent or \$40 per thousand, while in 1931 only \$15 a thousand was paid, one and one-half per cent.

200 PERSONS HEAR FACULTY PROGRAM

Willamette university faculty members were elated at the response to their first lecture program held in Waller hall last night. They estimated that 200 persons were present to hear Prof. T. S. Roberts in organ recital and Prof. Herman Clark speak on "Oregon and Its Geological Story." A special, highly applauded addition at the end of the lecture was a piano organ duet by Prof. Roberts and Miss Gretchen Thielson.

Prof. Clark described the condition of Oregon in past geological eras, told of the origin of Crater lake and of the chief mountain peaks, commented on the lecture in the John Day region and on the Snake River canyon, the deepest gorge in the world.

At the next lecture program, January 25, Prof. Morton H. Peck, head of the biology department, will speak and Miss Minnie Miller, organist for the First Baptist church, will be heard in recital.

DRAWN BY ENGINEER?

No. by Boy Scout 13 Years Old
SEEKING MERIT BADGE

A budding young civil engineer, aged 13 years, has been discovered in Boy Scout troop six sponsored by the Hollywood community club. He is Frank Chamberlain and he caught the attention of Scout Executive O. P. West yesterday with a neat, accurate and detailed map which he submitted to earn a merit badge.

To collect the data for the map, which covers an area approximately two miles long and a mile and a half wide in the North Santiam county near Marion, young Chamberlain spent all of his Christmas vacation week, Executive West said. The results of these efforts are "one of the finest maps ever turned in," in West's opinion.

To the scale of one inch to 412 feet, the lad sketched in minute details such as fields and type of cultivation, swamps, timber, all buildings including barns, houses, schools and post offices, railway tracks, telegraph lines, roads, streams and bridges. He had carefully stepped off all distances and noted the proper compass readings and even accounted for normal error in his measurements.

By triangulation, he drew the Santiam river and its tributaries to scale.

Executive West pointed to the boy's work as an example of following explicitly the directions in the merit badge manual. Chamberlain did the work without assistance, he said.

The map probably will be submitted at the court of honor to be held at the court house here next Wednesday night.

Another scout, Hugh Heritage of Falls City troop 36, recently drew what is believed to be the only map existing of that town.
