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CARLTON CREAMERY OPERATES, PROFIT

Cooperative Enterprise is Reported Success at Meeting Here

Members and patrons of the Carlton Creamery met in their annual meeting Monday and heard with satisfaction the report of the first year's operation as a cooperative creamery.

Besides showing a net profit of over \$2000 for the year, A. B. Swan, manager, reported that the creamery had paid one cent above Portland delivered butterfat prices for the entire year and a two-cent premium much of the time.

Another accomplishment which was considered with pride by the membership was the winning of the gold medal for first prize butter at the Oregon state fair. During the year the creamery manufactured over 260,000 pounds of butter, over 80 per cent of which rated "extra" quality.

The creamery returned over \$50,000 to the dairymen of Carlton and yesterday paid an additional return of one half cent premium to all shipper-members for each pound of butterfat delivered during the year.

A short program of entertainment followed the forenoon business meeting at which Max Gehlhar, director of agriculture, and Paul C. Adams, executive secretary of the Oregon dairy council, spoke on the marketing of dairy products through health educational work.

Directors of the creamery are: Otto Skiton, president; Herman Bernards, vice-president; George C. Johnson, secretary-treasurer; George Thompson, W. H. Milne and F. C. Jernstedt, directors.

MAKE GROWS, PRICE OF BUTTER STEADY

PORTLAND, Jan. 11.—(AP)—Increase in butter makes continues in the local territory but was not as heavy as some had forecast. In the meantime prices here appear at least steady. Butterfat was unchanged for the day.

Market for live chickens continues to reflect a very firm demand that is quickly cleaning up offerings here each day. The call includes all lines.

Weaker feeling was more generally apparent in the market for potatoes. Primary points, while outwardly showing a steadiness, are in some instances quoting reductions, which are reflected in sales to retailers. Deschutes No. 1 selling mostly 95¢-1 for 1932.

Market for country killed lambs continues to show strength with a shortage of offerings compared with demand. Sales of top lambs 1¢ higher and up to 1¢ in some instances.

The shortage of country killed ewes has been relieved somewhat and the strong request appears a trifle tempered. Prices held. Hogs are steady but cannot cows were a trifle easy.

WHEAT BOOM WEAKENS, DROPS 2c

TOP LAMBS BRING 25c MORE HERE

Salem Markets

CHICAGO, Jan. 11.—(AP)—Big selling to realize profits took place in the last moments of wheat trading today, and the market collapsed nearly 2 cents a bushel.

Until the final transactions, wheat showed a decided upward trend most of the time, and had risen in some cases 1 1/2 cents above yesterday's top, surpassing any prices since August and about equaling the sharp run-up of 8 1/2 cents a bushel, scored during that month. Highest prices today were reached after word came that a move to kill the enacting clause of the farm allotment measure at Washington had been defeated.

There also were rumors of disturbed political relations between Russia and Japan.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1/4¢ off to 1/2¢ up, oats 1/4¢ down.

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Turkeys Drop a Cent; Shipments Showing An Increase

A post-holiday drop of one cent in the price of turkeys was chalked up yesterday with local markets paying only 13¢. Top lambs were bringing \$4.50, an increase of 25¢.

Throughout the country fruits and vegetable shipments show an increase; prices mostly irregular. Combined forewarnings of 26 fruits and vegetables last week increased to about 11,650 cars but were nearly 5,000 cars lighter than during the same period last season. Greatest gains over the preceding week were made in movement in snap beans, new cabbage, celery, lettuce, oranges, and potatoes. Compared with the opening week of 1932, the recent shipment reports show a great decrease for apples, old crop cabbage, cauliflower, celery, lettuce, onions, potatoes, mixed vegetables, and various citrus fruits.

SHADING IS RESUMED AMONG EGG DEALERS

PORTLAND, Jan. 11.—While there was no open cut in the price of eggs in Portland, following the recent advance, more or less price shading below established quotations was shown. Chief among the cutters appear those dealers who were reported as quoting the highest figures here.

In quarters close to the local co-ops the report suggests that enemies of the local co-operative movement were making a determined attempt to handicap the Oregon organization, now that their leader, E. J. Dixon, is dead. In other quarters a report persists that northern interests were trying to gobble up the local co-ops and make them a part of the Puget Sound organization.
