Preschool Children Wanted—Preschool children especially should be brought to the Marion county health center, 261 Masonic building, between 8:30 and 10 o'clock tomorrow morning to receive toxoid and vaccination treatment, according to Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, health officer. The outbreak that was 50 per cent of the children under school age immunized to diphtheria and smallpox, there would need to be no fear of epidemics of this disease in children of any age. At present about 35 per cent of the preschool children in the county are immunized and from 40 to 45 per cent in the city. Dr. Douglas is aiming to immunize around 100 children a year.

SENATE ADJOURNS UNTIL NEXT WEEK

The senate held a brief session Monday morning, adopted one resolution, and then adjourned until 11 a. m. Monday. The resolution provided for a charge of five cents, plus postage, for all senate calendars, bills, memorials and resolutions, other than those allotted to legislators, committees, educational institutions, certain county officials and libraries. Legislators were restricted to receipt of five bills and calendars. Senator Dunne said the enforcement of the resolution would result in saving the taxpayers of Oregon many thousands of dollars annually. He referred to requests of various state departments for as many as 70 copies of one bill.

Highway Board Meets Soon to Contract Work

Bids for the construction of roads and bridges aggregating a cost of more than \$350,000 will be opened by the state highway commission at a meeting to be held in Portland January 25, it was announced yesterday. Probably the most important projects include 1.8 miles of grade.

RULING OF PROBATE COURT IS REVERSED
Decision handed down yesterday by Judge L. G. Lewelling in case of estate of Dora Walker reverses the probate judge of August 14, 1931, and orders the executor, S. Ellis Purvine, to draft the final account in keeping with the decree. The appeal was made by Elmer W. Purvine, one of the heirs. Judge Lewelling's decree states that the will of Dora Walker bequeathed residue and remainder of the estate to a niece of said Dora Walker "as an individual and not as a class and that portion of the estate which would have gone to Emily Walker Jeffries, had she survived Dora Walker, should be divided and distributed among the heirs of Dora Walker" and not the surviving niece of said deceased Emily Walker Jeffries. The case is remanded to the lower court to ascertain any heirs of Dora Walker who were alive at the time of her death, and to enter decree accordingly.

State Fund for Accident Board Expenses Asked
A state appropriation to cover the administrative expenses of the State Industrial Accident commission probably will be sought during the present legislative session. This was indicated Thursday in a letter prepared by Charles T. Early, chairman of the commission, for the consideration of the legislators. Early declared that employers had been liberal in their contributions to the workmen's compensation fund while the state had shared no part in the expense of conducting the department. He said the state should assume responsibility for the administrative costs. The law provides that the administrative expenses shall not exceed 10 per cent of the receipts of the commission.

Lions are Saving Pennies Already For Cheer Fund

Bound to accumulate an ample Christmas cheer fund for 1933, Lions club here has already started saving up the pennies, in fact. At each meeting members who have had a birthday during the
