

PASTOR'S PAY PROBLEM ENDS

For Christian Church; Other Groups Hold Annual Elections

SILVERTON, Jan. 12. — The Christian church has figured out a unique and most interesting manner of handling the financial end of the church work during times of depression. The official board of the church has adopted the plan and it is being brought before the congregation for three consecutive Sundays. Little doubt was expressed of its ultimate adoption.

Dr. and Mrs. W. O. Livingstone, both of whom are pastors, will receive about \$30 in cash a month. The parsonage is furnished by the congregation and all members who cannot pay cash and have other means of adding to the contributions will be given credit for these. In this fuel, foodstuffs, and in some cases gasoline will be furnished for the use of the pastors.

Salaries are Cut

Salaries of two Silvertown pastors were substantially and voluntarily cut at the annual meetings of Immanuel and Trinity Lutheran churches held Wednesday. At Trinity church, the meeting was held Wednesday night and Rev. C. L. Foss' salary was lowered from \$1800 a year to \$1200. Rev. Jensen received a similar reduction at Immanuel's meeting held all day Wednesday. Both pastors receive free house rent.

Reports at Immanuel church were from the trustees, of which H. Severson was chairman. The finances of the church were shown

in good condition. Oscar Johnson made the treasurer's report. Rev. Jensen reported for the Sunday school and Mrs. Oscar Johnson read the report made out by the president of the Ladies' Aid society, Mrs. M. E. Strand. H. B. Jorgenson reported for the guild in the place of its president, Miss Hilda Olson.

Elections resulted in Albert Farnus and Oscar Overlund as new members of the board of trustees to succeed Conrad Johnson and H. Severson. Carl Thorkildson was made the new member of the deacon's board while L. Opedahl was elected to fill the vacancy made by P. O. Henderson's resignation. H. B. Jorgenson was re-elected secretary; Elmer Johnson was made treasurer, succeeding Oscar Johnson, who was made assistant. Rev. Jensen was elected superintendent of the Sunday school; Jonas Byberg, organist, Mrs. Arthur Dahl as assistant; cemetery board members, Oscar Lee and Conrad Johnson; ushers, Conrad Thorkildson, Orvin Severson, S. Jorgenson and Oscar Olson.

At Trinity church Rev. Foss' report showed a confirmed membership of 348. Three families were admitted to membership at the Wednesday night meeting, those of Amos Corhouse, Harry Sannerud and Olaf Hagen, the latter of Scio. The budget committee's report given by J. J. Moe showed the new budget for local expenses at \$2224.64. Last year's disbursements were shown at \$3154.29.

Women Aid Relief Job By Benefit

DALLAS, Jan. 12.—Plans are being completed by a committee from the Dallas Woman's club for an all community benefit performance to be held at the Majestic theatre, January 31. Mrs. E. E. Fulgham is chairman of the committee and is being assisted by Mrs. E. W. Cruson, Mrs. A. R. Hartman and Mrs. R. Y. Morrison, president of the club.

Various organizations of the city will participate in the benefit and will put on the different numbers. The Legion auxiliary are planning a comedy act, the firemen a blackface skit, the Neighbors of the Woodcraft a one act play, and the Delphin society will present the two, living pictures presented by them at the assembly held in Salem. Interspersed with these acts will be tap dancing numbers, a tumbling act, music by the high school orchestra and other special features.

The performance will be held both in the afternoon and evening, admission for the afternoon to be either canned or packages of food which will be turned over to the Red Cross for distribution. The evening will be the usual cash admission usually charged by the theatre management. George Gould, manager, is donating the use of the theatre and services of the staff for the two performances which it is believed will raise a nice sum of supplies and money for the local relief work.

ELIZABETH M'KAY FINAL RITES HELD

TURNER, Jan. 12.—Elizabeth McKay, 80, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Hester Crume here, January 6. She was born near London, England, December 25, 1852, and left with her parents when young for Georgetown, Ontario.

In 1878 she was united in marriage to Phillip McKay and moved to Portage La Prairie, Manitoba, where she lived for 12 years. In 1891 she and her family came to Turner where she lived on a farm west of town for 39 years, after which she moved on account of ill health to the home of her daughter in Turner. Her husband died in 1895, a son in 1920 and a daughter in 1911.

She was a member of the Presbyterian church, the Eastern Star, and also of Surprise grange for 40 years.

She leaves five children, 11 grandchildren and one great-grandson. The children are Mrs. Hester Crume, Mrs. Carrie Mitchell, Mrs. Elizabeth Schaeffer of Turner, Mrs. Beatrice Ott of Roseburg and Albert McKay of Salem. Four sisters also survive, who reside in Canada. Funeral services were held Monday, January 9, from Rigdon's, with interment in Twin Oak cemetery here.
