FEWER LAMBS ARE ON FEED, REPORTED

CORVALLIS, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Fewer lambs on feed in the United States on January 1, less beef and pork in storage than a year ago, and annual records showing more consumption of beef in 1932 than the year previous are reported today in the weekly livestock review by the U.S.D.A. bureau of agricultural economics cooperating with the O.S.C. extension service. Conditions of livestock at present are reported good except in the southwest where severe weather has brought varying conditions.

Something more than five million head of sheep and lambs were on feed January 1 in principal areas, about a 15 per cent decrease from revised 1932 estimates. Most decrease came through the corn belt states, though the states west of the continental divide showed about 14,000 head more than a year ago. Totals of all western states including North Dakota and Texas show a 3,000,000 reduction.

Holding of beef in storage increased during December but the January 1 total was lower than a year ago and sharply below the five-year average. Pork totals are also below a year ago and the five-year average. Lamb and mutton holdings are about the same as a year ago, but only about half the average.

Consistent inspection figures of beef show an increase in grading service of about 50 million pounds in 1932 over the year previous, indicating increased consumption of at least that much in view of the lower storage holdings at present.

CANNERS BUYING ON NEW GRADING BASIS

Canners are buying an increasing share of their fresh fruits and vegetables on the basis of grades developed by the bureau of agricultural economics, U. S. department of agriculture, according to William E. Lewis of that bureau, addressing the new York State Vegetable Growers association at Rochester, N. Y., January 13.

Approximately 275,000 tons of fruits and vegetables—principally tomatoes—for canning or manufacture, were inspected on the basis of United States grades during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1932. The work was done by the bureau in cooperation with the states at about 250 canning plants or receiving stations in eleven states. The products inspected included tomatoes, apples, spinach, red sour cherries, pears, and juice grapes.

The speaker announced "there is an insistent demand for grades for other fruits and vegetables for canning use," and said, "the bureau is now studying grades for sweet corn for canning." He said that the use of grades is yielding better prices to producers, encouraging producers to grow better quality foods, and enabling canners to effect economies in canning operation costs. Consumers, he declared, are getting better values for their money.

Motorists Warned Against Impeding Firemen at Work

Recent narrow escapes of firemen from collisions has led Chief of Police Frank Minto to order strict enforcement of the city ordinance regulating motor traffic in the path of fire trucks and the vicinity of fires. The ordinance, he pointed out, gives fire trucks the right of way, forbids motorists following fire fighting equipment closer than 500 feet away and requires that no automobiles be parked within a block of a burning structure.

It is common talk among firemen that Salem motorists pay scant heed to fire sirens, slow up the progress of fire trucks headed for conflagrations and get in the way at the scene of blazes.

WON AND LOST FAMOUS BEAUTIES—DIED ALONE



The tragic death of Jack Pickford, brother of Mary and formerly a film idol in his own right, in the American Hospital at Paris, recalls the colorful career of the young man who won and lost three of America's foremost stage beauties, to enter the valley of the shadows alone. Pickford, who was 36 at the time of his death, made his first stage appearance in 1909 in a production called "Fog Robin." In 1919 he turned to the films, where his sister Mary was rapidly climbing to eminence as "America's Sweetheart." He was then the husband of Olive Thomas, noted Follies beauty, once described as the world's most beautiful girl, having married her in 1917. In 1920 they had a "second honeymoon" following a separation. It was then that tragedy first entered Pickford's life. Returning to their hotel after a party, Miss Thomas inadvertently took a dose of mercury bichloride in mistake for a sleeping potion and died five days later. Two years later, Pickford married Marilyn Miller, also a Follies beauty, but she divorced him in Paris in 1927 after a two-year separation, during which they had remained friends. In 1930, Pickford took another bride, this time Mary Mulhern, a New York actress. But again the romance went on the rocks, Miss Mulhern divorcing him last year in Los Angeles. Pickford never achieved the fame that came to his sister upon the screen, although he appeared in many pictures for various companies, and even managed his own company for a time. His death was the climax of a long series of nervous breakdowns. Mary Pickford has ordered her brother's remains sent home for burial in Los Angeles.

Marion county receives \$5201.38, Polk county \$1282.97, Yamhill county \$256.54. Total collections were \$347,001.65, refunds \$2081.42 and administrative costs \$50,581.37. The highway department receives \$19,225.53 and the counties \$98,112.78. Apportionment of \$50,181, representing receipts under the motor transportation act, for the same period was announced by the state department. Marion county's share of the 25 per cent going to counties was \$665.03. Polk county's \$164.05 and Yamhill's \$256.54.

A number of Salem drugists countered Friday with Representative Martin, in connection with her bill providing for a 10 per cent tax on all tobaccos, cosmetics and malt sold in the state of Oregon. The drugists were said to be opposed to the bill on the grounds that the tax would prove a nuisance. Tobacco dealers also have indicated that they will referendum the tax in case it is approved by the legislature. Representative Martin said the proposed tax would raise approximately \$1,500,000 during the biennium. Money derived from the tax would be applied toward reducing the state property levy.

REHEARING SOUGHT IN MOLTZNER CASE
