GOLD RUSH DAYS IN COLORADO DEPICTED

Robinson Stars Again, With Bebe Daniels and Aline MacMahon Supporting

A picture filled with the thrill and romance of pioneer life in the mad gold rush days of Colorado's founding will be seen today in "Silver Dollar," a first National picture which begins a three-day engagement at Warner Bros. Elsinore theatre today.

Edward G. Robinson, famous for his powerful screen characterizations, has the intense and colorful role of Yates Martin, the Colorado silver king, who rose from poverty to riches overnight. Bebe Daniels and Aline MacMahon head a notable supporting cast, which includes Jobyna Howland, DeWitt Jennings, Robert Warwick, Harry Holman, Russell Simpson, John Marston, Charles Middleton and Marjorie Gateson.

The screen offering is based on David Karsner's popular book, which tells the rise and fall of A. W. Tabor, an influential pioneer who played an important and spectacular part in the early history of the nation.

The picture presents Robinson as a rough miner with a "Midwest" touch, who soars from poverty to wealth and power. When romance touches him, he discards the wife who has stood faithfully at his side in the struggle for riches, and with a younger, more beautiful woman, starts on a career of eccentricities that startled the world. While at the peak of his wealth and fame, his fortune collapses with the adoption of the gold standard.

The screen play was adapted by Carl Erickson and Harvey Thew and was directed by Alfred E. Green.

HOLLYWOOD SHOWS VIVID JUNGLE PLAY

Constance Bennett Comes In Most Emotional Role at Capitol

He plays what is termed a "hard" game, daring, but not to the point of recklessness. He spends most of his spare time on the polo field and enjoys the company of his ponies.

Started on Stage
Tracy, who portrays the role of a cocky young radio car detective in "Me and My Gal," coming today to the Grand theatre, being co-starred with Joan Bennett, came to pictures from the New York stage, where he attained prominence in several Broadway productions. He reached the peak of his career on the stage when he won wide acclaim for his characterization of "Killer Mears," leader of the convicts in "The Last Mile." It was his virile performance in this play that led to a contract with Fox Films and he has since become one of the outstanding character players in motion pictures.
