HOVENDEN ESTATE BACK IN PROBATE

The estate and will of Sarah A. Hovenden was re-admitted for probate yesterday, the probate court naming Ronald A. Jones as executor and James F. Fuller, John Murray and Dolph Cose as probate judges. The estate is so probated because of recent death of the executor, George B. Hovenden, and because of errors in the former proceedings. Jones was named vice-executor in the will.

The estate was first admitted to probate May 9, 1919. The will drawn November 23, 1927, leaves the bulk of the estate to three children, Mrs. Emma Jones of Marion county, Mrs. Annie Gilbert of California and George B. Hovenden of Portland. A large number of small bequests, mostly to grandchildren and great grandchildren, are made. The largest bequest, \$500, is left to Miss Anna A. Dunn.

The new order in probate cancels all proceedings of the former executor.

Woodburn Board Purchase of Bus May End Trouble

WOODBURN, Jan. 14—Final incident in the transactions between the school board and Paul Folquet heirs over operation of the Woodburn school bus was likely written Friday, when the school board bought a bus and used it for the first time. The bus owned by the Folquet estate was relieved of the school license, and goes back to the heirs.

The school board first offered to rent this bus of the estate, which countered with offer to sell for \$700, which the board held too much. Later the board paid \$30 a month rent for use, pending a settlement.
