STATE TAX PROBLEM HELD NOT GREATEST

Kiddle Points to Counties And Cities; Says Extra Tax Will be Needed

The real taxation problem is overshadowed and lost in the attention given to the state situation, President Fred Kiddle of the state senate told the chamber of commerce luncheon gathering yesterday in asserting that the real problem lies in the counties, cities and other political subdivisions of the state.

"If some steps are not taken by this legislature to assist the county and other units through the problems that confront them, I cannot see much but receiver-ship for some of the counties," Kiddle declared.

Legislature can and must help this situation. He indicated such bills as the one to consolidate counties and the one providing for county managers as steps in this direction.

Kiddle asserted he feels the "legislature is just in tinkering" with the problem confronting the state. But he decried press criticisms of the extra session, and particularly a metropolitan paper's criticism on the second morning of the session, as "not giving the legislators a fair break."

Defends Extra Session — He defended the extra session and declared its worth while in that, for the first time in his knowledge, "it made every legislator think, and brought forth a serious and earnest consideration of the tax problems."

An actual and not merely a book deficit exists for the state, Kiddle asserted, adding he believes no substantial additional cuts can be made in the state budget. He said "difficulty is going to be had in sustaining some of the cuts already made."

He said any substantial cut in the budget must come out of higher education, but with already heavy cuts there, and in face of the merger vote last November, he holds no hope for a materially reduced budget, which will, on report of the ways and means committee's present investigations, put before the legislature again the question of an extra tax.

EVIDENCE FINISHED IN TRIAL OF REAM

DALLAS, Jan. 16 (Special) — All evidence in the state's case against L. H. Ream, charged with a morals offense involving his daughter, was completed yesterday and the case, on be- half of Judge Walker, will go to the jury following the judge's instructions this morning. Bruce Spaulding has represented the defense, and District Attorney Barnhart has handled the prosecution.

The grand jury today reported on 10 cases, with six indictments, four of which are secret. Open true bills were against L. H. Ream and Arthur Lacey and Frank Morse, charged jointly with burglary not in a dwelling. The jury audited and approved the report of the district attorney on the prohibition fund.

Term Exams at Salem High Will Open January 30

THREE HURT BADLY AS AUTOS COLLIDE

Mother-in-law of Meyers, Washington Official, Is Held to Blame

Three Salem residents suffered severe injuries and Mrs. W. J. Hill of Olympia, Wash., was arrested on a charge of failing to give right of way, as the result of Mrs. Hill's automobile colliding with a machine driven by A. A. Gueffroy, 909 D street, at Union and Church streets yesterday morning. Mrs. Hill is the mother-in-law of Victor Meyers, jazz leading lieutenant governor of Washington.

Miss Claudine Gueffroy, being cared for at her home, last night was suffering intense pain from a broken collarbone and dislocated shoulder which she received when she was thrown from the Gueffroy machine. She also was badly cut about the head, and generally bruised.

The exact nature of injuries suffered by Betty Bonnell, who was riding with the Gueffroys, had not been determined last night. The attending physician said she might have sustained a slight fracture of a vertebra, in addition to lacerated knees. She is at Deaconess hospital.

Mr. Gueffroy received painful bruises and knee injuries but is able to walk about.

Municipal Judge Poulsen postponed the case against Mrs. Hill in order to learn the outcome of the victims' injuries. She was released with Bert R. Pitcher, 1935 North Capitol street, standing responsible for her appearance in court.

The Gueffroy car was struck after it had passed mid-intersection, the investigating city officer reported. Neither machine was overturned.

CONTEST IN NEWS PLANNED FOR 4-H

County Club Leader Wayne Harding has mailed to 4-H clubs over the county data regarding a club news contest, in which reporter of each club may compete. Possibility that a county scholarship will be awarded is indicated, and in any event the county winner will compete for the state scholarship.

Foreign Cars in State Decrease

There were 90,760 non-resident motor vehicle permits issued in Oregon in 1932, as against 93,142 in 1931, Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, announced Monday. The peak of registrations was reached in August, when 16,806 permits were issued. The 1932 non-resident registrations were the smallest since 1925.

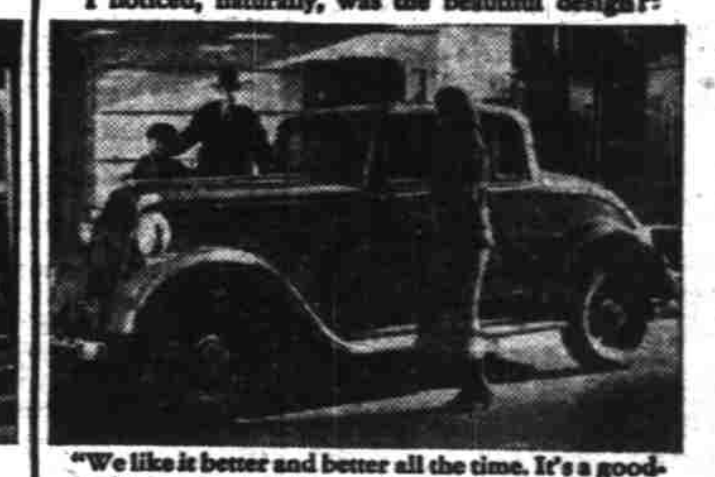
