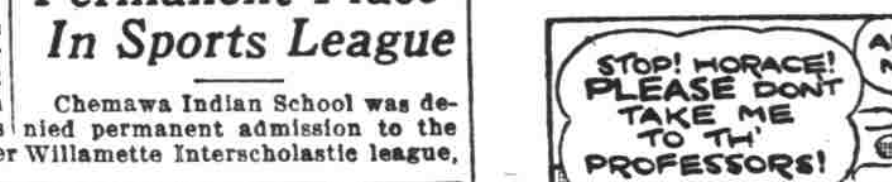
The next move will be up to the Yankees. However, matters may be adjusted through a personal conference between Ruth and Col. Jacob Ruppert in the near future.
