Annual Reports—Annual reports have been filed in probate matters of Gerald K. Allen, incompetent; and the Lucy Killiam estate. In the latter, the probate court has ordered partial distribution of funds to include \$200 to each Glen E. Gorton and Heryl A. Halseeth. Guy O. Boyce has also filed report in estate of May F. Boyce covering period from June 1, 1931, to December 31, 1932, showing balance of \$78.82.

Eppers Ask Time—Arraigned in justice court yesterday on charge of obtaining property under false pretense, R. J. and Alta May Eppers, husband and wife, requested 24 hours in which to enter plea. They were given until this afternoon. The alleged illegal act was giving an n. s. f. check in payment for cattle, according to the complaint against them.

Police Car Bought—Purchase of a new police car, authorized by the city council Monday night, was made yesterday by the police committee. The new car is a Ford V-8 coupe, which will replace the 1928 model coupe used by the chief of police. For the present, Chief Frank Minto will drive the new car, giving the old official chief's car, a sedan, to the east prowl, Officer Leo Strong.

Jail Window Broken—The steel sash, supposedly unbreakable windows installed in city jail a few months ago are being added to already, because a prisoner recently broke an entire frame from its hinges. A mechanic was working yesterday connecting the sashes to the window frame with heavy chains to prevent their being pulled down again.

Jobs Are Menore—Only five jobs have been provided through the U. S. Y. M. C. A. Employment bureau this week and wages from those are meagre. Yesterday three men were sent to work at short odd jobs, with their total earnings just 80 cents. Monday one laborer received two hours work and one woman was hired as saleswoman.

Incorporate—Articles and incorporation for Jim and Bill, Inc., have been filed here by James M. Smith, W. P. Watkins, Xenia Smith and Beesie L. Watkins to conduct a service station business here. Smith and Watkins is an old name in the service station business here. Capitalization is \$10,000.

BILL TO PROHIBIT BONDS IS OFFERED

Senate Bill Would Affect Judicial Officers; Speed is Urged

Salaries of all judicial officers would be under the regulation of the legislature, provided a resolution introduced by Senator Dickson Tuesday is adopted by both the senate and house and later approved by the voters.

Under the existing constitution the salaries of judicial officers cannot be reduced during their tenure of office. This provision of the constitution would be eliminated by Senator Dickson's resolution.

The sale of state highway bonds, other than for refunding and to meet a catastrophe, is prohibited under the provisions of a bill introduced by Senator Dunne. This bill will be discussed at a meeting of members of the joint roads and highways committee and the state highway commission to be held here this afternoon. Reports indicated that the state highway officials are favorable to the measure and will not voice any opposition.

Senator Goss is the father of a resolution which would eliminate grand juries, and make it possible for district attorneys to file informations against persons accused of crime.

Persons who have attained the age of 14 years would be eligible to receive a motor vehicle operator's license under the provision of a bill introduced by Senator Mann. The existing age limit is 16 years.

Transients Checked on—Transients visiting Hotel de Minto are now being registered, their names, occupations, last jobs and addresses being noted down. The cold weather has resulted in an increased number of men applying daily for lodging and food, according to Chief of Police Frank Minto. Around 100 a day are taking advantage of the accommodations there. As a result, panhandling on the streets is at a minimum.

Two Get Licenses—Wedding bells are slated to ring today at Mill City for Leo J. Crook, 31, Lyons truck driver, and Evelyn Booth, 18, student of Mill City, according to license issued yesterday by the county clerk. A second license was issued to Leslie Meinert, 42, farmer, and Dolly Weddle, 43, housewife, both of Albany.

Amends Complaint—Second amended complaint has been filed in damage action brought by Hattie May Bond as administrator against the Southern Pacific railway. Damages of \$10,000 are sought for death of O. P. Bond, who was struck last April 1, by a train as he was traveling across Mack crossing in the Turner district.

Joseph Carson Visits—Among the prominent visitors at the state capitol Tuesday were Joseph K. Carson, mayor-elect of Portland, and C. W. Orton, attorney. Mayor-elect Carson was accorded the courtesies of the senate and later held a brief conference with Governor Meier. Carson will assume his office in Portland on July 1.

14 BILLS OFFERED BY CITIES LEAGUE

Regulating Truck Traffic, Bond Refunding Method, Among Laws Sought

The work of the League of Oregon Cities convention held here recently, and its legislative committee, will be presented to the house here today in the form of 14 measures, William M. Briggs, past president of the league announced yesterday.

Cities would be permitted to designate certain city streets as upon the senate the necessity of getting the various committees into action. He said a large number of bills had been introduced, but that none of them had been reported out for third reading.

highways for heavy truck traffic, under provisions of one of the most important measures. The league asserts that passage of the bill would greatly aid in eliminating traffic congestion and make the streets safer for pedestrians. Another measure would permit cities to license dogs within their corporate limits and remove the territory within incorporated cities from the operation of the present state wide law.

Other measures include: Measure requiring security for all deposits of municipal funds. At present there is no law requiring city treasurers to provide such security.

Bill providing for the issuance of tax anticipation warrants to provide monies for municipal governments pending receipt of tax collections.

Authorizing cities to levy occupational licenses for revenue purposes. Further protection of cities in regard to their liens on sale of property by county after tax foreclosure.

Receivership Bill Proffered
Providing method by which a property owner may have his Bancroft assessments refunded over a new ten year term.

Providing for municipal administrator or receiver for cities in financial stress. This bill would permit the governing body continue to exercise its functions as usual but the receiver would direct the payment of funds.
