

# COUNCIL VOTES SALARY SLICES

## Reduction of Night Patrol Also Recommended to Silverton Dads

SILVERTON, Jan. 17.—At a special meeting of the Silverton city council the salaries of the street commissioner and city police were reduced 15 per cent, to take effect January 1, 1933, at the recommendation of the finance committee of the council. The committee also recommended that "if possible" the services of one night policeman be eliminated or placed on part time so that the time of the two night men do not overlap. As it is at present the two men are working double from 11 p. m. to 4 a. m. However, Mayor E. Garver was not of the opinion that such a move is possible right now.

In discussing the matter it was brought out that while there was not so much carousing around town because of lack of funds there seemed to be more petty thievery than before. However, it was pointed out that the patrol car had for the past several months had cut down petty thievery at least 50 per cent.

George Hubbs, city recorder, made mention of the fact that it wasn't a matter of whether or not anyone earned his salary but rather the fact that last year only 70 per cent of the taxes were collected and that the budget was approximately \$8000 short in funds.

Pool halls owned by A. Heater and John J. Ruud were both granted licenses.

A communications from the League of Oregon Cities asking for an assessment of \$25 to be used in legislative lobbying was tabled. City buildings were placed in the hands of the health, fire and water committee for care. This committee is Councilmen Leard, Wilson and Conrad. Lower street on West Hills was mentioned as needing attention and Mayor Garver placed the matter in the hands of the street committee for investigation with Conrad as chairman.

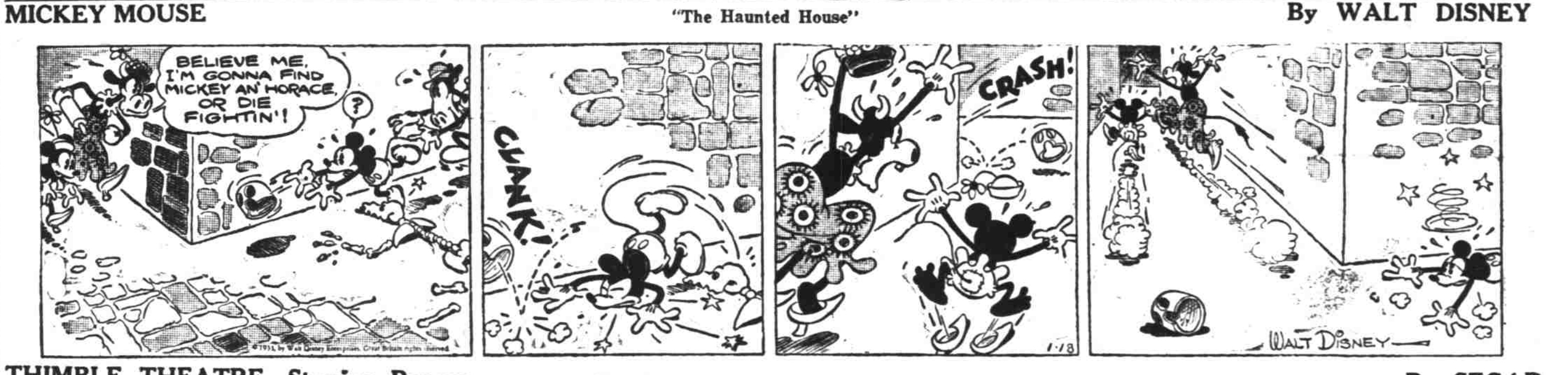
A pretty sight to see, the large pussy willow buds peering bravely through the cold snow and looking like spring may be a long way off yet.
