REDUCED INTEREST RATES ARE SOUGHT

Child Labor Resolution is Introduced; Senate's Sessions are Brief

Lowering of interest rates in Oregon is sought in two bills introduced in the senate yesterday. One of these bills, by Senator Dickson, changes the legal rate of interest from six to five per cent and the contract rate from 10 to eight per cent. The bill was said to have received the support of the state grange and other rural organizations.

Under the provisions of a bill introduced by Senator Zimmerman the interest rate of three per cent per month now authorized on small loans would be reduced within the legal maximum contract rate of 10 per cent per annum. This bill is directed at so-called chattel loan associations and other similar organizations.

A resolution introduced by Senator Dunne and 17 other members of the legislature provides for the ratification of a federal constitutional amendment regulating and prohibiting the employment of persons under the age of 18 years.

Senator Burke introduced a resolution authorizing a committee of three members of the senate and three members of the house to investigate the affairs of the state board of control or any other state department or institution.

Meier Okays Appropriation — The senate approved a resolution endorsing the American legislators' association which was created for the purpose of disseminating information among the various states and legislatures.

Three bills were passed when placed on third reading. One of these was drafted by Senator Chinnock and relates to the time for filing liens and motions in the courts.

The two other bills provide that county boards of equalization shall notify persons who file tax assessment protests of the date on which the final report of the boards was adopted.

Governor Meier late in the afternoon signed a house bill appropriating \$20,000 for the expenses of the present legislative session. Legislators said that other similar appropriations probably would have to be authorized later.

The senate held two brief sessions, and recessed shortly after 2 p. m.

UTILITY DISTRICT CREATION OPPOSED

Existing financial conditions are not such as to warrant creation of the Tillamook people's utility district for the immediate development of hydro-electric power, the state hydro-electric commission declared in a report released here yesterday.

The report indicated, however, that it might be advisable to create the district in case its operations were confined to the election of a board of directors to conduct an investigation of the economic conditions and possible state-wide power development and distribution.

"If the question before us was to determine the advisability of immediately acquiring the present plant of the Mountain States Power company we would hesitate to advise immediate action," the report read.

"The feeling of the commission is that the present financial stringency prevents forming a reliable estimate of what the future might bring forth in the way of increased consumption of electric energy, and it is advisable that the people should deal with this important matter a step at a time."
