CANVASS IS OPENED FOR RELIEF FUNDS

SILVERTON, Jan. 20.—Representatives of various local organizations and churches were called together Wednesday night to work out some means of obtaining funds to carry the welfare work at Silvertown.

The message from Mayor Garver, who is chairman of the committee, explained that Silvertown had been very fortunate in the past in not being greatly in need of organized welfare work to any great extent. There had always been a surplus in the local community chest and this year when things were more difficult than formerly, the surplus was gone and no assistance could be expected from the county.

Need of help is greater than ever and, as Mayor Garver said, the welfare committee feels that it is the concern of all local organizations to give all the help possible.

Particularly there is a call for beans, sugar, rice, bacon, canned milk, coffee and breakfast foods. There is also desperate need for clothing and shoes for boys and girls from 12 to 15 years of age.

Julius Alm, representing the Masonic order, suggested that perhaps the easiest and most rapid way of answering the present immediate need was to go out and take a systematic solicitation of the city. Mr. Alm's suggestion was acted upon and he was made chairman of the solicitation committee. Others serving with him are C. L. Bonney and Emil Lee. The three are soliciting funds this week.

It was thought that around \$100 would care for the immediate need of food. Churches represented Wednesday night were Methodist, Christian, Immanuel Lutheran and Adventists.
