# EAST END HOOP HIGHLY ELUSIVE

Bearcats get 20 First Half And Cliffdwellers 19 In Second Period

Someone had better get a stepladder and ascertain if there are not, as on a certain hilarious occasion two years ago, fine wires strung across the east-end basket in the Willamette gymnasium.

Saturday night the Willamette Bearcats won a weird game from the Columbia Cliffdwellers, 29 to 26. In the first half Columbia was held to three field goals and a free throw, and Willamette led at half time 20 to 7; the margin was 16 to 2 at one time.

Then in the second half Willamette was held to four field goals and a free throw, Columbia meanwhile closing the gap steadfly until, with two minutes left, it was only one point.


