Miss Miller is well-known to Salem audiences having been organist at the First Baptist church for the past four years. The interest in her program has been heightened by the announcement that as a final number Miss Miller will play the brilliant duo "Fantasia" by Demarest being assisted at the piano by Karl Wenger, well-known Salem pianist.
