

Local News Briefs

Ball Put at \$1500—Ball for Cleve Baker of Newport, Oregon, was out at \$1500 and not furnished by Baker after a preliminary hearing held here this week before Judge Hergsheim, United States commissioner for the federal court in Portland. Baker was bound over to the federal court grand jury in Portland on charges of manufacturing liquor. Two hundred and fifty gallons of mash and some whiskey are said to have been in his possession when he was arrested in Lincoln county. Portland court authorities arranged to pick Baker up at the county jail here.

Parts With Booze—Sheriff Dunn held his first official "booze party" this week. But unlike most parties where four or five pints of stiff whiskey is consumed, this one ended in no difficulties—except chagrin at a bystander to see the whiskey poured down the sink in the sheriff's office. The whiskey was "loot" from a drunk driver picked up last Saturday, and it was disposed of in the prescribed legal fashion after a man entered a plea of guilty in justice court here and paid the fine assessed.

RAMSEY DEAN OF STATE BAR, HERE

Founded W. U. law School, Once Mayor of Salem; Likes Roosevelt

Judge William Ramsey, 54, McMinnville attorney and dean of the bar in Oregon, came to Salem yesterday to appear for his clients in a case before the state supreme court. The jurist, himself a member of the state supreme court in 1913 and 1914, goes to his office daily and is in good health. He contributes articles to newspapers frequently on matters of public interest signing himself "Veritas."

The judge was the founder and first dean of the Willamette university law school. Later he was mayor of Salem. During his residence in Yamhill county Judge Ramsey has served as circuit court judge there.

A democrat by conviction, Judge Ramsey yesterday expressed pleasure in the election of Franklin D. Roosevelt and said he was hopeful he would make a good president. "I liked the candidate better than the platform," the judge remarked.

A daughter of Judge Ramsey has been a member of the staff of the Oregon state hospital for 30 years; his son is Dean Ramsey of the Episcopal church in Portland.

Forty some children at the state school for the blind are mourning the disappearance of their beloved playmate, "Cap." Cap, a big sable and white collie, has been missing since Saturday.

The white collie of W. M. Reid, Route 5, whom he occasionally visited, was found dead Sunday morning. Could this mean that both dogs encountered poison? The children refuse to think so; but each morning they grow more and more anxious for his well-being, as they rush from their dormitories and hear so friendly bark, feel no furry body at their sides, eager to race them to the dining-room, no careful nose ready to direct their steps along the walk.

About the school, from the little people who lip his name as "Cap," to the big boys who take him swimming in the spring, there is one question on every tongue—"Where is our Cappy?"

SPAULDING HAS PLAN

Henry C. McDowell, well-known stock buyer and meat market proprietor of Salem, died suddenly at the family home, 884 South 12th street at 8 a. m. Tuesday. Heart trouble was given as the cause of his passing. Mr. McDowell had kept active, though for several months past he had not been quite as active as usual. He was at the market which he and three of his sons operate on South Commercial street up to Monday evening.

Funeral services will be held Thursday afternoon at 1:30 at Rigdon's mortuary, in charge of Rev. Guy Drift of the First Christian church. Active pallbearers will be William S. Walton, John Brophy, Walter Thompson, Curtis Cross, Guy Irvin, Roma Hunter. Honorary pallbearers will be T. B. Jones, Frank Bello, Edward May, M. L. Jones, Clarence McCow, L. P. Aldrich. Burial will be at Belmont Memorial park.

Mr. McDowell was born in Brownsville June 3, 1857 and lived all his life in Oregon. He was a stock buyer for 50 years, putting in 30 years as buyer for the late E. C. Cross. Student Barracks For Economy is Dean's Suggestion

Suggestion that barracks for men students, cooperatively conducted on a basis similar to the barrack system used in war time, would greatly reduce higher education costs, was made Tuesday by Dean Frank M. Erickson of Willamette university. Erickson said he had not consulted with the executive board of the school's trustees and indicated his suggestion was purely tentative.

Living costs at fraternities and private homes are materially higher than costs would be under such a system, Erickson indicated. Plain food and no fancies would be allowed if barracks were established and students would be able to continue their work for an education without such hampering demands for running expenses.
