

ALUMNI FORM ORGANIZATION

Nearly 100 Attend big Event
In Honor of Scio School
Graduates

SCIO, Jan. 25.—A permanent alumni organization was effected at the annual gathering and banquet held Friday night and attended by 97 alumni, former teachers and guests. Rolia Shelton, 1911, toastmaster Friday, was elected president; Mrs. Birdelle Sticha, 1911, vice-president; Mrs. Ed Meyers, 1905, secretary-treasurer. The next meeting will be in April, 1934.

An unusual feature of the banquet was that there were present a father and daughter, both graduates of the high school, Rolia Shelton and Mrs. Curt Ferguson. So far as is known, this is the only such case. There are several students now in high school whose mothers were graduates.

H. E. Tobie, a former principal, told of some of his experiences here, especially the building of the gymnasium, Mrs. George Whitely, 1929, and Mr. Gloria Long Thurston, 1929, both former teachers, reminisced. Outstanding events in the history of the high school which were mentioned included the planting of the locust trees in 1903; presentation of the clock which hangs in the assembly in 1911; the planting of the rose bushes around the school grounds in 1916; purchase and installation of the drinking fountain in the lower hall in 1920; building of the gym in 1922, and hanging of the stage curtains in the assembly in 1930.

Although the first class graduated in 1902, 1904 was the oldest class represented at the banquet. Chester Coffey, a photographer from Portland, was the only member of this class present.

OIL DIVIDENDS ARE DECLARED

By Polk Farmers' Union Company at First Annual Meeting

DALLAS, Jan. 25.—Members of the Farmers' Union Oil company held their first annual meeting here Monday. Dividends were declared and were paid to the stockholders present. Two directors were reelected for a term of two years.

Since starting operations some 10 months ago the oil company has done a total business of \$23,263.85. The dividend paid this week was the second patronage dividend and the regular dividend on preferred stock. The company owns its own distributing plant at Derry and is completing payments on tank trucks.

R. C. Dodson, president, and R. W. Hogg, secretary, were the two directors who were reelected at this meeting. Ronald Jones, C. L. Gilson and George Woods are the holdover directors. An amendment was adopted at this meeting which will enable farmers who are not members of the oil company to become members of both the Farmers' union and the oil company by assigning their patronage dividends for such a purpose. This means that a farmer who wishes can patronize

the company and as soon as accrued dividends amount to a share of stock and his annual dues in the Farmers' union, he automatically becomes a member of both organizations.

The Polk county Farmers' Union Oil company was the first co-operative organization of this type to be started in western Oregon. Similar organizations are now being started in Yamhill, Washington and Columbia counties.
