PORTLAND AUTOISTS JAILED AFTER FIGHT

Their faces slashed and bruised by fist stabs, Harley and Howard Wilson of Portland are being held in county jail pending preliminary hearing, both on charges of assault and battery and attempting to operate a motor vehicle without the owner's permission, and Harley on charge of being drunk on a public highway. Combined bail asked on the three charges was \$400 each, which they were unable to furnish.

The pair were battered up by C. L. Beckner and O. S. Poston when they broke a window in the Beckner home early yesterday morning in seeking aid in pulling their mired automobile back on the highway in the Mission Bottom district, according to the explanation made in justice court. One of the Wilsons was said to have been knocked off the Beckner porch into the front yard.

Both men resisted arrest by state police, the latter reported. Howard Wilson pleaded guilty to being drunk on a public highway. Judge Miller B. Hayden postponed passing sentence until he could know the outcome of the other two charges.

The Capitol Battlefront

Incidents and Personalities More or Less Connected With the State Legislature and Its Achievements

FRANK JENKINS, president of the Southwestern Oregon Publishing company, dropped in to look over the legislative session yesterday. Jenkins makes his home at Eugene but he is often seen at Roseburg, Medford and Klamath Falls where his concern owns daily newspapers. Jenkins writes a widely read column in each newspaper. For years he was editor of the Eugene Register. A middle-aged, sprightly, ambitious and able newsman, Jenkins is recognized as one of the ablest members of the press in Oregon. His public hobby is canalization of the Willamette river as far south as Eugene. His private hobby is putting out good newspapers.

Squibs: Stanley Satchwell, mailing clerk in the senate, has a background for the job, for years his mother has been postmistress at Shedd and she knew her stamps, for at Shedd the more you sell the more you make. Representative Weyers and wife of Hood River are the hobbling twins, each one still being about on crutches due to injuries received in their automotive progress to the statehouse. "Bill" Hare of Hillsboro who has a voice like a sea-captain, had a fine time Thursday shaking hands. For years he was a senator and loved it. On the scene will be seen that they were going to take shovels with them to lodge that night, anticipating the legislative members would be there in full force. A slender little fellow is Truman Collins of Portland, here to confer with Senate Spaulding. His father is E. S. Collins, well-known Portland lumberman. Ray Gill, grange leader, is back at the session.

A. C. Holloway of the Portland News-Telegram is a hard working reporter-editor. When at home he can lay out, copy-read and head the entire paper each day if forced to it. When in Salem he can keep the statehouse as well "covered" as his paper wishes it. The N-T is pro-Holman although it says little against Meter, presumably because of his influence on page 10 or 12 of the paper.

M. A. Lynch of Redmond is the leading merchant there and until recently his organization was in business in Bend but liquidated his holdings there. Lynch is a quiet, calm, well-informed man of good judgment. Named by Governor Norblad to succeed R. W. Sawyer on the highway commission, Lynch was soon blown out

of power by the Meter administration. He says the hardest problem for a merchant these days is continual shrinkage in inventory valuation.

McMahan of Marion county looking over his political interests in the lobby. He works with the grange, labor, Holman, Burke, Brown, Zimmerman affiliation. O. West, red tie, cigarette, bright eyes, alert to what is going on. Hands of Dunn of Jackson tremble in the senate when he arises to explain his bills. He dislikes to speak. Well-fed William Einzig, leaving his hair in the board of control office to look over the situation. Clare Lee passing by, a former state insurance commissioner and Eugene resident. CROSSING, CHERRY AVENUE IMPROVED

Bonus Payments Slowing Down

Slowing down of payments on mortgages due the state bonus commission is reported at the latter's offices here. Increasing difficulty of borrowers in raising funds and growing newspaper talk of moratoriums on debts in other states have added to the difficulties in collections, bonus commission officials say. Total monthly payments of interest and principal on loans of more than \$20,000,000 aggregate \$120,000 compared to \$150,000 two years ago.

OREGON NATIVE IS BURIED THURSDAY

Flora Herren Bailey, 66, wife of George H. Bailey, who was captain of Portland police for nine years, died at her home in Tigard Sunday.

Mrs. Bailey's parents were early pioneers in Oregon, and she was born near Turner, in 1867. She was active in grange work, and held offices in the Turner grange numerous times. She was an alternate delegate from Oregon to the national grange convention in Seattle.

Surviving besides her widower is her mother, Mrs. Martha E. Terren of Tigard; sister, Mrs. Ida Morris of Portland.

Funeral services were held Thursday at 2 p.m. in the Tigard grange hall, with Rev. E. C. Hicks officiating. Members of the Portland force acted as pallbearers.
