

SILVERTON CHAMBER
EYES LEGISLATURELuxury tax, \$5 Auto License
Fee and Utility Regu-
lation Asked

SILVERTON, Jan. 26.—A. O. Nelson made the following report for the legislative committee of the Silvertown chamber of commerce at the monthly dinner held Wednesday night:

"We sincerely hope that during this session of the legislature ways and means will be found

whereby the tax burden can be lifted from real property.

"We believe that this can and should be done, first by a substantial reduction in the cost of the state government, and second, by setting these revenues from sources more able to pay. The general sales tax is not popular here. Anything enacted by this legislature in the way of property tax or general sales tax will in all probability be referred to the voters and by them defeated.

"We therefore urge the enactment of a sales tax on luxuries and sufficient increase in the income and inheritance tax to meet the state's needs. We believe that these would now stand a fine chance of meeting with the public's approval.

"We urge a \$5 auto license fee. If more money is needed, we sug-

gest a small graduated property tax on cars, such tax to be collected at the time license is issued, or a one cent additional gas tax. On account of the scarcity of cash, the latter may be the most desirable because many people who are able to get the \$5 for the license may not be able to get the cash to pay the tax.

"As a means of saving money we urge: 1, that in the future license plates be made at the state penitentiary; 2, that the law be amended so that car drivers who were formerly licensed be not required to stand examination except upon order of the secretary of state; 3, issue permanent license plates for each car.

"We urge the enactment of regulatory utility laws that will give greater encouragement to the extension of electric light and power lines into the rural communities."

The report as given by Mr. Nelson was signed by Mr. Nelson, M. G. Gunderson, Ed Porter and R. A. Fish.

Representative and Mrs. Otto K. Paulus were special guests at the chamber of commerce dinner.

At Silvertown

SILVERTON, Jan. 26.—"Government Efficiency" afforded considerable amusement at Silvertown this week when it was learned that several residents had received "duns" from the defunct First National bank, to collect taxes on safety deposit boxes.

Typical of the "efficiency" was one received by Dr. A. J. McCannell notifying him that in his case the amount due is two cents.

Dr. McCannell made out a check on a Minot, North Dakota bank for the two cents and mailed it to the receiver, Lloyd H. Kelley, of the defunct Silvertown bank with the accompanying letter:

"Dear Sir: I have your statement of January 17 asking for the payment of two cents which I am hurrying to pay lest the depositors of the bank be put to any

more expense in its collection. I note it has already cost them three cents in postage and whatever expense there is to writing and mailing the letter, but what difference does that make so long as we can have some 'Amos and Andy' efficiency?

"I am enclosing my check in payment of this bill and request that you send me a receipt for it."

Dr. McCannell is still looking for the receipt.
