## Y. W. C. A. CAMPAIGN FOR FUNDS STARTED

**New Budget is Nearly Half Of old; Special aid Is Given Women**

The annual campaign for funds with which to maintain the running organization of the Young Women's Christian association of Salem was launched with a dinner Monday night at the Y. M. C. A. At this time over 100 men and women heard the work of the organization explained and saw the results of its effectiveness in the community as a much needed civic activity.

During the present times of economic trial the service of the organization is called upon even more than in ordinary times. It is the only place in the city where a woman or girl, stranded, can be housed until she can secure a location; here aged women, women with children, young girls are being aided in numbers to secure employment and credit has been extended to those out of employment; the lobby provides the only convenient place where girls may bring their lunches at noon, or where they may rest if working broken shifts, and the same lobby furnishes a convenient place for out-of-city women to meet people.

In addition to these unique services, the organization meets many other needs. It aided 5000 women to secure employment last year, furnished more than 500 free beds and many meals, gave 300 girls a chance to have a summer vacation under nearly ideal conditions at Camp Santia, and it has worked out organization for girls who would otherwise be lonely and without a chance to develop socially. Clubs and organizations of interests in this time of crisis have been a vital part of the organization work for the young women of the city.

**Service Not Curtailed**—The amount being asked for this year is nearly half less than that asked for three years ago, and according to Elizabeth Gallaher, executive secretary, the work of the organization and its service has not been cut but rather greater service is being extended.

**4-H CLUBS HERE TO TAKE UP FORESTRY**

An order for 846 trees, to be planted in Marion county by boys and girls enrolled in 4-H club forestry projects, was sent to the forest nursery at Corvallis yesterday by Wayne Harding, county club leader. The order includes 220 Douglas firs, 120 black locusts and a miscellany of other varieties.

There are 10 forestry clubs in the county with nearly 100 members, each of whom is required to plant 10 trees as part of the project. These trees must be planted for farm usage or in a group forestry project, and cannot be used as pure ornament. This is the first time 4-H work in the county has included the forestry project. Lane county members carried on a successful experiment in forestry club work last year.

**RELIEF BILL IN** Report of the unemployment relief committee on its state-wide relief bill was approved Monday morning by the house which puts the bill up for third reading and final action in the house today. Three members of each county committee under the revised bill are to be appointed by the county court; four will be appointed by the governor. Approval of the bill is expected in the house.

## MACHINES COMING TO SCHOOL SHOPS

Salem schools have been advised by the navy department of the authorization to transfer five valuable pieces of machine shop equipment from Bremerton navy yard to Salem for use in the vocational machine shops at the high school.

The equipment consists of a milling machine and four engine lathes and has been made available through the federal disarmament program, and was obtained by application to the secretary of the navy by the state board of vocational education and department of vocations.

T. T. Mackenzie, vocational director at the Salem high school, estimated that cost of new machines like the ones to be received would exceed \$6000, and although they have been in use for some time would be of unequatable value to the shop department and would supply a long felt need. It will be possible to enlarge the scope of training and allow more intensive instruction.

Several of the machines now in use at the school have been used constantly for 14 years and are badly in need of replacing. Application for the machines was made two months ago. The only cost to the local school will be the cost of transportation; a comparatively small item.

## JAIL POPULATION LOWEST, 5 YEARS

Population at the county jail was the lowest in more than five years at the final roll call yesterday, with only eight prisoners on hand, Sheriff A. C. Burk reported last night.

The number at the beginning of the year was 23, and by mid-week last week the total was reduced to 14. Three prisoners were released Monday: Joe S. Murphy, who served out 90 days for shoplifting; Jimmy Price, who served out a \$50 fine on assault and battery charge; and Walter Nolitt, 70, released on his own recognizance after arrest last week on a charge of defrauding an innkeeper.

Sheriff Burk indicated that he will do all in his power to hold the county jail population to a minimum, as this will result in a saving to the taxpayer through lowered cost for meals.

## Dental Hygienists Exam is Proposed

Dental hygienists, sprightly nurses who now assist tooth-pullers, would be subject to examination and license under provisions of a license bill introduced Monday morning. The measure provides for a board of five appointed by the governor, which shall examine and, if qualifications permit, license dental helpers.

## LONGERMAN INSISTS UPON TAX REFORM

**Counties to be Bankrupted Unless Remedy is Found He Tells Chamber.**

Necessity for the legislature to pass some revenue-raising tax other than one of real property is inevitable, Rep. Frank Longerman, former speaker of the house, indicated in address to the chamber of commerce Monday noon. The house member predicted that the ways and means committee will be unable to report a substantial reduction in the state budget as submitted by Budget Director Hansen.

This predicted failure to lower the budget will necessarily mean additional revenue, but with many of the counties of the state already reporting greater than 50 per cent delinquencies on tax collections, a property tax will be out of the question; unless the state wishes to bankrupt some of its counties.

Longerman believes a consumers' tax is the reasonable solution, because with the income, excise and inheritance taxes, the state's taxation would include revenue from all citizens, according to ability to pay.

Oregon has reached the end of its spending spree as a state, Longerman says, indicating that rigid economy will prevail for a long period.

Longerman pointed to the unemployment situation as other major issue with which the legislature must deal, and declared the state does not dare fail to discharge its obligation to the unemployed "or before long communism with all its terrors will be stalking the state." Oregon people must forget selfish interests in this time of crisis, he said.

## VOTE QUALIFICATION APPROVED BY HOUSE

The house Monday gave approval by a large majority to two bills, which if approved by the senate, will limit the franchise on all votes on special taxes and bond authorities to citizens who pay real and personal property taxes. The bills were passed under authority granted by a constitutional amendment passed by voters of the state last November.

Representative Nichols, sponsor of the measures, urged their passage as did Representative Kelly who framed certain changes in the bills in committee.

Taxpayers are designated as persons against whom real levies have been made by the county assessor in the year preceding the date of the election. Payment of the taxes is not required.

Representatives opposing the bills characterized them as undue limitation of franchise, claiming that most citizens indirectly, if not directly, paid real taxes or else paid income and miscellaneous sales taxes.

Vote on the main one of the two bills, H. B. 68, showed 49 ayes and nine nays with two members absent.

## Rigid Advertising Regulation Asked In Bill by Lynch

**Rigid regulation of the type of advertisements merchants could do and the means they could adopt in holding sales is proposed in a bill introduced Monday in the house by Representative M. A. Lynch.**

The measure would make it illegal to sell goods at auction below the price of the seller, would forbid advertising goods in limited quantities, would make it illegal to substitute one brand of goods for another, would forbid prices expressed in fractions of a cent and would make it illegal to advertise prices of goods based upon a contingent purchase of other articles.

Mr. Lynch also introduced a bill which would make it illegal for firms to sell for varied prices in the state, freight costs excluded.

## PLAN NO REDUCTION IN INTEREST RATES

No intention of reducing interest rates on savings deposits below three per cent was manifested here yesterday by Salem bankers. Portland banks have announced their rates would be lowered to two and one-half per cent effective March 1.

Salem bankers said that low interest on sound securities made it difficult to continue to pay three per cent but indicated any reduction might lead to diminished deposits. This reduction would be reflected or greater demands that borrowers pay and local bankers said they would prefer to continue their present lenient loan policy as long as deposits had held up as well as they have in the last two years. Savings deposits locally are only slightly below the point of January 1, 1930.

## Paying Petition Shovers Banned

Payment of individual circulators of initiative, referendum or recall petitions would be made illegal under terms of a bill introduced in the house Monday by Representative Carl Abrams of this county. Managers of supervisors of petitions circulators could be paid under the provisions of the Abrams measure. The bill is designed to curb alleged "racketeering" which have made it possible for small minorities, through paid circulators, to get legislation to the ballot for a vote.

## RELIEF TO DEBTORS

Aiming to extend relief to debtors, Representative Paulus of this county Monday introduced a bill which would allow circuit judges one year of time in making decisions on mortgage cases. Under the present law all decisions must be made within three months from the time a circuit judge has the matter submitted to him, else he cannot legally receive his pay warrant.

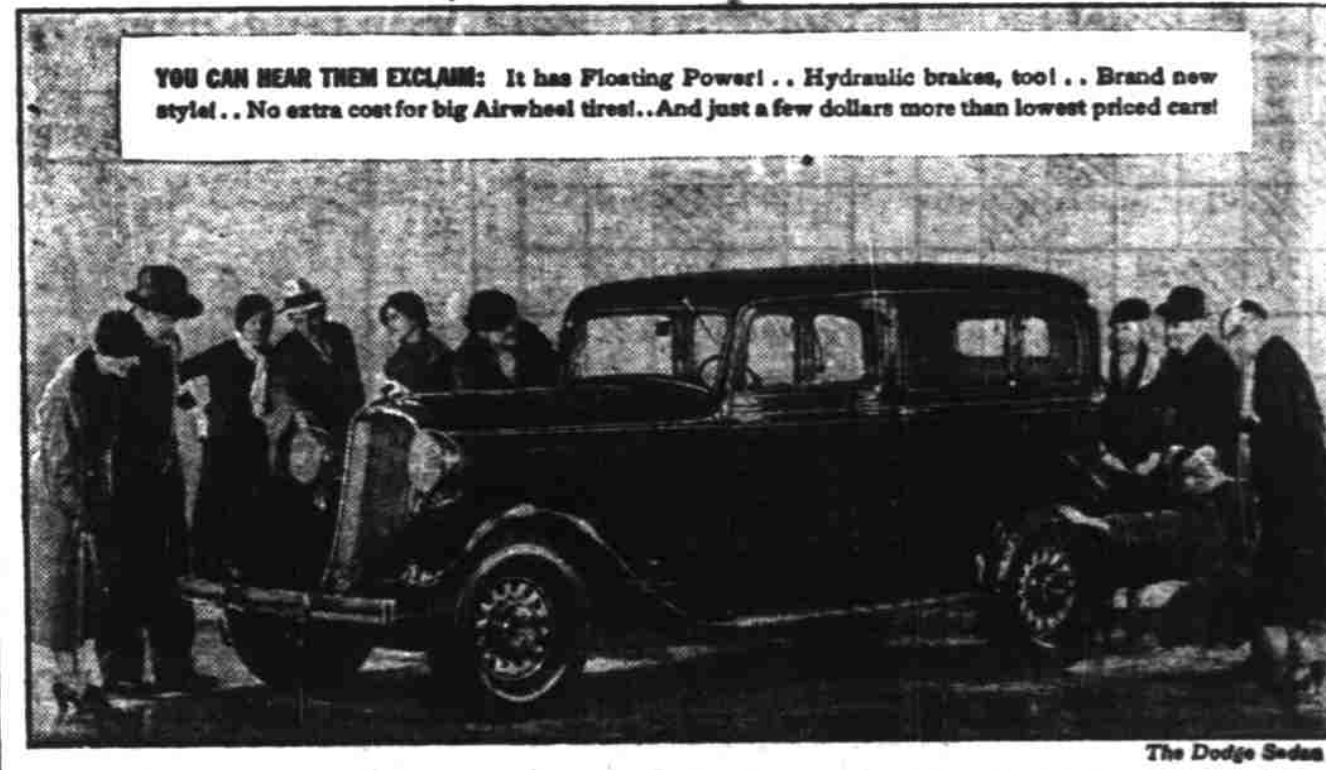
