Corvallis to Get Executive Office Of State Schools

The executive offices of the state board of higher education, which have been maintained in Salem for the past two years, will be moved to Corvallis, Saturday, Dr. H. M. Lindsay, secretary of the board, announced yesterday.

The offices will be conducted on the campus of Oregon State college. The operating personnel will be retained.

Lindsay said the transfer was being made as an economy measure.

COUNTY ROAD FUND SHARE IS \$70,254

Marion county will receive \$70,254.54 for secondary highways, according to allocation of secondary highway funds just made by the state highway department, the county clerk was informed yesterday. The sum allocated to Marion county includes \$50,733.49 which is equal to the one-mill levy of 1933, and the other is the county's share, \$19,521.05, of the Multnomah county surplus.

Actual receipt of funds is, of course, dependent upon action which may be taken by the legislature. However, if legislation is "in" on this matter as in the past few years, the county will receive the money.

The total designated for all counties of the state in the secondary highway fund is \$1,019,526.60. Marion county is second to Multnomah, Clackamas third and Lane fourth in the amount of funds allocated.

REGISTRATION AT SALEM HIGH LESS

Registration at Salem high school for the second semester of the school year starting Monday dropped off somewhat over the first term. Checkup at close of school Tuesday showed a total registration of 1453 and the total last semester was well over 1500.

Enrollment figures from all the city's public schools revealed a slight decrease from the corresponding time a year ago although it is expected that some of the difference will be made up in the next few days. Some students are still out of school with some form of illness.

PROTEST INSURANCE AGENTS EXAM BILL

Speakers before the joint insurance committee Tuesday afternoon protested vigorously against enactment of House bill 159, providing qualifications for insurance agents and their examination. It was argued that a similar law had cost the state of California approximately \$130,000, and that less than 50 per cent of the agents had been examined.

There was no objection to House bill 131, providing that the annual license fee for local insurance agents shall be increased from \$3 to \$5. A bill providing for non-resident insurance brokers also was approved. The committee also gave favorable consideration to House bill 133, relating to the examination of domestic insurance companies.

Considerable opposition developed to House bill 140, relating to newspapers in which insurance companies shall publish their annual statements. This bill probably will be reported out with the recommendation that it does not pass.
