

Medford Junior High Hoopsters Coming to Play Parrish

GAMES FRIDAY AND SATURDAY

Annual Series Expected to Be Warmly Contested; Visitors Strong

Scraping together by various means the cash necessary beyond the guarantee offered by the local school to finance the trip, the Medford junior high school basketball squad will arrive in Salem Friday for a two-game series with Parrish junior high. Such a series has become an annual event and the games have always been close, Parrish holding a slight edge on victories to date.

The situation in southern Oregon is similar to that here; there are not enough junior highs within easy traveling distance to provide each other with a full season schedule of competition, and the junior high hoopsters play in the county B league. Medford junior high has won six out of eight games in this class. Parrish has lost only one game, a non-conference clash with Mill City.

Coach Ray Henderson of Medford has announced that his starting lineup probably will include Coats and Lindley, forwards; Van Dyke, center; Hicks and Dickinson, guards. Van Dyke is a relative of Frank Van Dyke, recently a law student at Willamette university. The Parrish squad has been strengthened by the addition of several players who were not eligible the first semester, and on this account Coach Frank Brown is not yet ready to announce his lineup. First game with Medford, Friday night on the Parrish floor, will be preceded by a preliminary game at 7 o'clock, in which the Parrish Trojans will participate. There will be only one game Saturday night and it will start at 7:30.

CRUCIAL COAST SERIES LOOMS Oregon State Heading for Seattle; Gill Works On his Offense

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Feb. 1.—Earlyway through its conference basketball schedule, Oregon State college basketball team will journey to Seattle this week end where it will meet University of Washington, conference leader, Friday and Saturday nights, in a two-game series which promises to be the deciding set-off of the season.

Now resting in third place on the conference ladder, with five wins and three losses, the Orangemen must at least split the two-game series with the Huskies to stay in the running for the crown and two wins are nearly necessary to substantiate any championship winning aspirations the Orangemen might have. In the two-game series between the teams at Corvallis last week, Oregon State won the first decisively and dropped the second by a narrow margin. Washington Huskies now in first place with five wins and only one loss, look like they are heading for their sixth consecutive championship. Oregon State, generally rated as the most feared team in the conference, has been coming fast so far this season but must overpower the Huskies to establish itself as a strong championship contender. Lewis and O'Connell Carrying Big Load Amory T. "Slat" Gill, Orange coach, has spent the greater part of this week perfecting his offense. Gill is faced with a large offensive problem in that Captain Ed Lewis, lanky all-star Orange center, and conference leading scorer, and Skeet O'Connell, flashy forward, considered the fastest man in the conference, are carrying nearly the entire Orange offensive burden. These two men have scored more than half the points garnered by the entire Orange squad this season.
