J. E. Parrish yesterday filed suit against W. F. Weddle to recover a total of \$1,238 damages for alleged damage to pasture and loss of sheep as result of turning Parrish's flock of sheep off the pasture on November 2, 1928.

Parrish says five of the sheep turned out were killed by a train, four were lost, and several days' labor for several men was required to round up the rest of the flock.
