All state highways were open. Burns experienced the coldest February weather on record, with the thermometer registering 26 degrees below zero. The temperature of 26 below zero was reported to be the lowest recorded since the weather bureau was established there 41 years ago. Pendleton had a minimum of 6 below and The Dalles, of 3 below. The Columbia River highway through the gorge was reported to be in a dangerous condition from ice. The Willamette valley was not spared by the cold. Salem registered a temperature of 12 degrees above and Eugene of 11 above. Further south, Roseburg reported the thermometer at 17 above and Medford at 20.

ing of the river to commercial fishing." Lonergan characterized the commercial fish lobby as "pretty slick," saying a man with a family and not a commercial fisherman could only take three salmon daily from the river whereas a commercial fisherman could take an unlimited catch. Representative Belton of Clackamas county as well as Representative Wells spoke against the bill and the other members of their delegation. Belton denied their was any concerted demand for the legislation and said it would afford little relief.

individual districts to accept the dictates of a powerful central board.

Mrs. R. L. Wright of Salem, representing the Education Promotion association and the Oregon congress of parents and teachers, declared that both groups were behind the unit plan as a means of solving present elementary school difficulties, including the highly controversial matter of school transportation.

Morton Tompkins, speaking for the grange, expressed some doubt as to the advisability of calling a general election at any certain time to have counties decide whether they wished to adopt the unit plan. He favored, rather, inauguration of the unit system in counties through use of initiative petitions by proponents in each section as sentiment developed.

Any action that may finally be taken on the county unit plan will affect all Marion county districts excepting those of Salem, Woodburn and Silvertown, which have pupil enrollments of more than 1000.
