KOVENZ CASE LOST UPON TECHNICALITY

For the second time, the \$17,250 damage action brought by Frank Kovenz, guardian, against T. A. Livesley, went out of court yesterday. The first witness for plaintiff had scarcely been seated and questioning just started when the defense made a motion that all evidence be excluded on ground that the action was not brought by the injured party.

Circuit Judge McMahan sustained the motion, but stated the statute of limitations does not hold for a minor, and that Kovenz' son, Andrew, may bring against Livesley when he reaches his majority in about five years. The suit was over alleged injuries sustained during the hop picking season by Andrew Kovenz.

Custer Ross and Allan Carson were defense attorneys. Charles Robinson of Portland, plaintiff attorney, entered proof of his evidence anyway, in case of a possible appeal, although a new suit is considered more likely.

The state's case against John Fennoch, accused of assault with intent to rob, will go to trial this morning. Fennoch held up Henry Layman at the latter's confectionery at Woodburn early last Sep-

tember, and fired a shot before he made his escape, it is charged.

FRANK BORGETT IS CALLED BY DEATH

Another member of the fast diminishing list of old pioneers of the west was lost with the death of Frank Borgelt last Monday.

Borgelt was born in St. Louis, Mo., in 1864, and came west to California 15 years later. He moved to Washington where he was married to Miss Anna Strackor in 1890. Following the marriage the couple came to Oregon and located four miles southeast of Salem in the Pringle district, shortly afterward again moving to Roberts where he was living at the time of death.

Of three children born to the union two are now living. One daughter died at the age of two years.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Anna Borgelt; son, John Borgelt of Salem; daughter, Mrs. J. F. Ringwald of Salem; four grandchildren, Richard, Raymond, Donald and Joan Ann Ringwald, all of Salem; three sisters, Mrs. Louise Rotter, Mrs. Kate Schultz and Mrs. Elizabeth Wilkins, all of Illinois; also a number of nieces and nephews in Washington and Illinois.

Borgelt had been active in farming until his health began to fail five years ago.

NINE ARE INJURED IN BUS ACCIDENT

Report of the Turner school bus accident Monday at 8:45 a. m. at a bridge about a mile east of Turner was filed with the county sheriff Wednesday for C. A. Bear by his wife, Ora Bear.

Bear, driver of the bus, suffered a broken rib; Rachel Garner sustained a bruised leg; and Marjorie Pickard, a bruised abdomen, the report says. Twenty-two students were riding in the bus when it skidded and left the pavement.

Besides the three mentioned, Dr. W. M. Thome of Turner found minor injuries suffered by six other occupants, a note appended to report says. These were: Mabel Beasley, right ear and side of head; Audrey Shoen, contusion of nose; Patricia Shoen, sprain of right forearm; Elsie Wilson, severe abrasion on right side of head; Jean Sawyer, injuries to finger; Elma Darkeus, also minor injuries.

Ray W. Gill, master of the state grange, yesterday declared that Mrs. Hannah Martin, legislator, had not quoted the grange's full position regarding a luxury tax at the public hearing held Wednesday on H. B. 35.

The present position of the grange, Gill explained as follows: "In 1931 there was no determined drive from the wealthy corporations of the country in favor of a general sales tax, and because of the present determined drive from this group, we fear that a luxury tax would only be used as a stepping-stone and expanded into a general sales tax program."

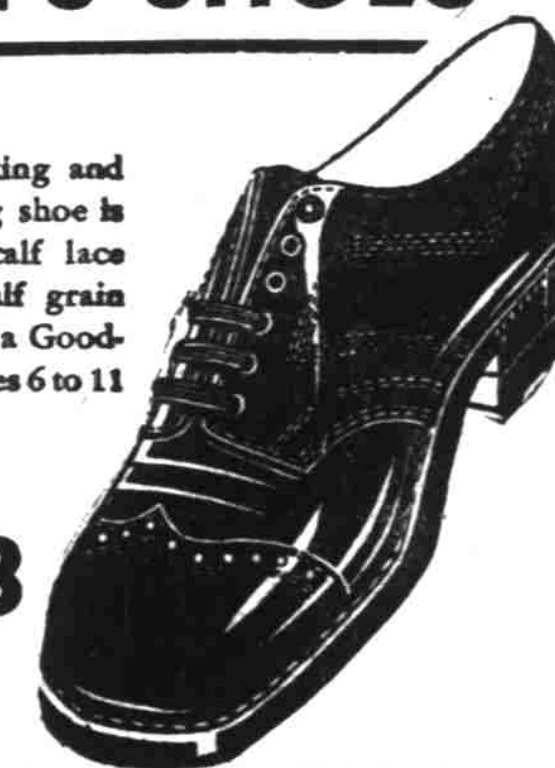
