GOLD PLAYS HAVOC WITH FRUIT TRADE

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 16—(AP)—Extremely low temperatures in most sections of the northwest played havoc with the normal fruit and vegetable trade, being the main factor in reducing the total movement to 907 cars, the lowest mark of the entire winter season according to a report made by the U. S. D. A. report of agricultural economics cooperating with the O. S. C. extension service.

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SUPPLIES OF EGGS IN STORAGE IS LOW

CORVALLIS, Feb. 16—A 10 rise in egg prices at Portland on Wednesday closed a week of fairly steady markets, ending with quotations being about 1c under those of a year ago, according to a weekly review issued today by the U.S.D.A. Bureau of agricultural economics cooperating with the O.S.C. extension service. Low prices have stimulated consumption and have caused some receivers to start storage operations earlier than usual.

The latest cold spell extending over most of the country had its effect on the egg market this past week, as eastern markets advanced sharply on mixed color eggs from the middle west and gained a cent on Pacific coast eggs. March futures at Chicago are not quite a cent below a year ago.

Season increases in production in California about balanced decrease in Oregon and Washington, so that the total continued irregular but about 10 per cent under a year ago. Fewer eggs being saved for hatching has tended to keep market supplies relatively large. Storage supplies for the country are the low ebb of 1932 cases about half the total a year ago and some 500 cases below the five-year average for this date.

LIVE CHICKENS IN DEMAND, PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Feb. 16—(AP)—Another spurt of demand was reported for live chickens today with very limited offerings since killers slumped the price so hard. All sorts were now being sought.

It has been practically impossible to secure extreme prices for small sized calves even though of top quality.

Slightly better trading tone was suggested for country killed hogs with prices steady to 1/2c lb. better in spots. Lambs were holding steady with sales mostly 11-12c for good stuff.

There was a rumor in the trade of the formation of another low priced onion pool to be offered soon at Brooks. Since the last one there has been practically no demand at the source and little at consuming points.

Wool is Irregular But Not Markedly Lower at Boston

BOSTON, Feb. 16—(AP)—The market for wool is very slow and quotations are somewhat irregular but not distinctly lower. Odd lots and inferior wools are being offered at lower prices and scattered small line of fairly good wools are available at slightly earlier prices. At the same time an occasional lot of mostly fine wool is selling to mills for immediate requirements at prices showing practically no change from recent quotations.
