WALL STREET MIXED WITH STOCKS LOWER

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Trends were mixed in the financial markets today. Stocks closed slightly lower after a few attempts at a pre-holiday rally and commodities continued their fairly favorable record, but U. S. government bonds again weakened and foreign gold currencies advanced.

Sales totaled 692,160 shares. The average net loss was fractional, though some individual issues ran out of line. American Telephone did not like the dividend cut by its New England subsidiary, losing a point net, despite later declaration of a regular by the Illinois company. American Can was still heavy, also off a point while Air Reduction sagged 2.

Several preferred stocks yielded several points. Nominal declines appeared for General Electric, Southern Pacific, Sears-Roebuck, Du Pont, Santa Fe, Canadian Pacific, Consolidated Gas and North American. U. S. Steel and New York Central were steady, while Liggett & Myers "B," McKeesport, Safeway and Homestake showed plus signs of a point.

EMERY OFFERS 40C FOR STRAWBERRIES

KINGS VALLEY, Feb. 21.—A meeting for prospective strawberry growers was held at Pedee hall Saturday with Mr. Emery to explain the proposition.

Mr. Emery is an experienced man in the cold pack process of preserving strawberries, having spent several years in this work in the strawberry growing sections around Forest Grove, Banks, Sherwood, Springbrook and other communities. He has recently bought the concrete building formerly occupied by the Falls City cannery which will be remodeled and used as a barreling plant.

Mr. Emery has also rented the Joshua Willis farm near Falls City and expects to plant 30 acres to strawberries this year and extend the acreage as fast as the land can be put in condition.

A berry-picking contract is offered by Mr. Emery with a minimum price of 1c per pound and more if the market warrants.

Sales of Wool Are Scattered

BOSTON, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Sales of wool are scattered and mostly very limited in volume. Selling prices are mostly on the low side of recent quotation ranges. An occasional call is received on strictly combing 56s Ohio and similar fleeces at prices in the range 19-20 in the grease or 25-27 scoured basis. Limited quantities of clothing and French combed fleeces sell at 12 1/2 to 13 1/2 in the grease with scoured basis values ranging 23-27.
