

### J. BOHANNON DIES AT INDEPENDENCE

#### Polk County Pioneer to be Buried Here; Funeral is Saturday, Independence

INDEPENDENCE, Feb. 23 — John S. Bohannon, old-time resident of Independence, died at the family residence, Second and Monmouth streets, today. Funeral services will be held here Saturday at 1 p. m. Rev. Dunmore officiating, and interment will be made in City view cemetery, Salem. Arrangements are in charge of the Keeney Funeral home. Mr. Bohannon was born at Brownsville, Mo., August 26, 1855. At the age of nine, he came to Oregon by mule team with his parents, to settle near Dallas. Ex-

cepting a short time spent in southern Oregon, the family has resided continuously in this vicinity. In 1881 Mr. Bohannon married Nettie Mitchell at Dallas. Four children were born to them. Mr. Bohannon was a charter member and long the clerk of the local chapter of Woodmen of the World, and also was a member of the Odd Fellows lodge here for 32 years. He at one time owned a sash and door plant on Main street but for the past 20 years had been in retirement. Surviving are the widow, and two daughters, Mrs. Bertha W. Smith of Dallas, Tex., and Mrs. B. Harm of Klamath Falls, and three grandchildren. The Junior Artisan lodge meeting which was scheduled to be held tonight has been postponed for one week. The regular meeting will be March 2 at 7 o'clock. This date will be the final one for entrance of names for the membership campaign contest.
