

Inspired Webfeet Trounce Washington Huskies 41 to 26

STATERS NEED ONLY ONE NOW

Oregon Team Plays Ball for Stahl, Forward who Dies Friday at Eugene

SEATTLE, Feb. 24—(AP)—Playing inspired ball for a team mate who died of pneumonia today at Eugene, the University of Oregon Webfeet won their second game of 13 during the season here tonight, trouncing the University of Washington Huskies, 41 to 26.

The cellar-holders in the northern division of the Coast conference outplayed and outshot Washington throughout the game, their lead at one time during the second period mounting as high as 38 to 20. The Webfeet led at the half, 21 to 13.

Olinger, a fast-moving forward who played in a guard's berth for Oregon, tossed in six baskets and three free throws for 15 points to lead both teams in the scoring.

During the day, George Stahl, 22, a regular Oregon forward, died of double pneumonia at Eugene, and the coach, Billy Reinhart, remained there at his bedside, while Assistant Coach John Kitzmiller came north with the team.

Captain Roberts of Oregon, second high scorer in the northern division race, was held to two baskets but he added three free throws for seven points. Lee, Washington right guard who moved over to center late in the game, was high scorer for the Huskies with nine points.

The defeat gave Washington nine victories and six losses in the standings and the teams meet again tomorrow night. The league-leading Oregon State five now must win only one of its two games with Oregon next week to win its first northern division title since 1925.

Andy Peterson Will Join Newark Club March 10 in First Professional Trial

Andy Peterson, outstanding hurler for Willamette university in the last three baseball seasons, has received instructions to report to the Clearwater, Fla., training camp of the Newark, International league club March 10, he announced Friday.

Before going east, Andy will work out for one week with the Hollywood Stars at Long Beach, Cal.

Newark is a "farm" for the New York Yankees, and it is evident that the Yankee management considers Peterson a future major league prospect, as he was signed to a Newark contract by Bill Easlick, scout for the Yankees, who watched Peterson pitch several times last year.

Andy's one-week workout with the Stars will be his first venture in professional ranks. On completion of three years' playing for Willamette, he toured Japan and Manchuria last summer with the University of Hawaii team.

Against a strong Manchurian team he pitched his third no-hit, no-run game. His first such performance was against Corvallis while playing with the Salem Senators in the summer of 1930, and the second, a perfect game in which no runner reached first base, was against College of Puget Sound in Willamette's 1931 season. That year he batted .597 for Willamette.

More than once Peterson has hurled victories for Willamette against the University of Oregon and Oregon State college, but his paramount performance is deemed to be the 12-inning game against Oregon State last spring in which he struck out 23 men, allowing seven hits and no earned runs, though Oregon State won, 3 to 2. Four major league scouts witnessed that performance.

Peterson is a McMinnville boy and has been studying law at Willamette, after first enrolling in liberal arts. He plans to complete his law course, possibly at Columbia university in New York.

RED AND BLACK BEATS ASTORIA

Long Toss by Engle Breaks Deadlock, Last Minute; Score is 22 to 20

There isn't much margin of supremacy either way between Salem and Astoria high school basketball teams. That was the unanimous opinion of fans who saw Salem defeat Astoria 22 to 20 on the local floor Friday night, as they recalled that Astoria had won the previous game on its home floor, 24 to 22.

Johnny Kelley scored just half of Salem's points Friday night, but it was the lone field goal by Melvin Engle, a guard who isn't supposed to do much scoring, that won the game for Salem in a wild last minute after the teams had been deadlocked at 20 - all throughout most of the final quarter. Engle's long throw touched an iron rail above the court on its way to the hoop.

There was room for considerable improvement in Salem's offensive play, a marked hesitation being evident in the matter of breaking for the basket when close to scoring territory. The defense left little to be desired, Engle and Morley playing a tremendously effective game under the basket, and their mates doing just as well in the outer defense ring.

Salem started with a bang, running up a 10 to 3 lead before the Fishermen decided to do things about that fast break. Introduction of Canessa into the fray also influenced the trend of affairs greatly. In the second period, Astoria overcame the lead and was ahead 13 to 12 at half time. Salem forged ahead again to 18-16 at the three-quarter post, largely on free throws. The checking was so effective in the final quarter that Salem managed but two field goals and Astoria only one.
