Honoring Memory of Washington on 201st Anniversary of Birth

SALEM, Feb. 24—An unusual and an exceptionally interesting Washington assembly was held at the high school Wednesday morning.

Miss Bernice Newhouse, English teacher at the high school, told of her impressions of the places especially associated with George Washington. Last summer Miss Newhouse and her parents visited in the east and made stops at numerous points of interest, including Washington, D. C., where preparations were being made for the Washington bicentennial celebration.

Two of Washington's war camps—Valley Forge and Fort Duquesne—were visited. At Valley Forge part of the original entrenchments and huts are preserved and the stone house that General Washington had for his headquarters may be found in the village. Miss Newhouse found it difficult to realize that it was possible for the soldiers to suffer as they did during their stay there.
