Wife of Famous George has Role Opposite him in "King's Vacation"

Florence Arliss, wife of the famous stage and screen star, George Arliss, plays opposite her husband as his queen, in his latest Warner Bros. picture, "The King's Vacation," which opens today at the Elsinore.
