Relief Plan Queried—C. G. Reller, city manager of Bend, has written to City Recorder Mark Poulsen asking how Salem and Marion county officials cooperate in handling relief work. Bend, he states, pays for the care of transients and has provided work for local residents with the county helping to pay them. The county now is asking the city either to assume to repay part of an R. F. C. loan or to pay entirely for the work done in the city, Salem and Marion county officials have no definite agreement on relief work. The city contributes \$500 to relief, spread among Associated Charities, Community Service and, indirectly, Hotel de Minto.

Railway Wreck Averted—State police believe a wreck on the Southern Pacific main line was averted Saturday night when a track walker discovered several spikes placed on the outer rail of a curve at Aurora. Police branded the spikes as the work of a crank and placed scant credence on current rumors that an attempt was to be made to hold up one of the S. P. trains.

Trial on Tomorrow—Retrial of the damage action, Wood vs. Sauer, will open in department one of the circuit court Wednesday morning, with Judge Lewelling presiding. Judge McMahan will sit in Lewelling's department if a case goes on there. The Wood vs. Sauer action went out on former trial when the jury failed to agree.

Gets 30 Days—Herman Dobrakosky, charged with assault and battery on Mary Dobrakosky, his mother, waived preliminary and appeared before Judge McMahan yesterday and admitted guilt. He was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail and paroled to his brother.

LAWMAKERS CRITICS UNFAIR, SAYS BEDE

Denunciation of Legislators Is Held Hangover From Days of big Graft

Criticism which the layman heaped upon the state legislators is largely unfounded, or at least not founded on sober thought, Elbert Bede, reading clerk of the legislature since 1919, told the chamber of commerce yesterday in defending the work being done by the present session. Bede, newspaper man of Cottage Grove, has been in attendance at each legislative session since 1915.

The public's denunciation of legislators is merely a hang-over of the days when hundreds of thousands of dollars were spent in buying U. S. senatorships, Bede declared. Public opinion to the contrary, the legislature today is a hard working, honest, sincere group, Bede said, asserting that personnel has improved every session despite the salary which is no compensation.

The layman feels free to criticize any legislator, despite the fact that the layman is not fully informed on that about which he criticizes and has little real interest in public affairs, Bede indicated. He cited the fact that Oregon in spite of its claims of being the greatest democratic government, polls not over a 50 percent vote on the most vital of issues.

The people of the state should initiate a decent wage for legislators, and there is no better place for start of the movement than Salem, where most of the money is spent, the reading clerk said. More than 75 percent of the laws enacted by the legislature are amendments to existing laws, created by new conditions, and not new laws to befuddle those already on the books, the reading clerk said.

MOSQUITO IS BIG ISSUE In Lower House at Legislature, Whereas WHALE IS LITTLE ONE

The lower assembly at the legislature Saturday turned its attention to mosquitoes and whales and a lively time was had by a number of the members before the former were disposed of.

A bill to allow county courts to formulate mosquito control districts and to assess the costs to taxpayers, finally passed, but the measure provoked Representative Hilton to charge that its sponsor, Representative Wells, sought protection at public expense, for certain golf courses and an amusement park in Portland. Wells and Representative Long-

ergan took violent issue with Hilton. A number of house members opposed the bill as one which opened the way for additional expense to taxpayers. The "whale" bill, sponsored by Representative Delch, went through pleasantly. It gives legal title to the state to all whales within three miles of the coast. Delch said the measure was an outgrowth of Portland's predicament recently when for more than a week a whale visited the city and was finally killed and claimed by individuals who could not be restrained for lack of law.

FIVE-CENT RIDES ON BUSES MADE EASIER

Five-cent rides on the Salem buses will be made easier starting March 1 when the company will sell 10 tickets for 50 cents. Hitherto the rate has been 20 tickets for \$1. While the base fare remains the same, the bus user does not have to put up \$1 to get the low cost rides. The change is made by M. A. Reed, who with E. W. Leinen owns the Salem bus lines, in response to a suggestion from S. A. Hughes, chairman of the public utilities committee of the city council. Hughes pointed out to Mr. Reed that many people did not feel able to put up \$1 at a time to get the five-cent ride tickets. Mr. Reed replied saying: "We are glad to place in effect March 1 the suggestion you offer. We find that our experiment in selling 20 tickets for \$1.00 has not increased our revenue but that it has increased patronage. We hope that by placing in effect your suggestion to sell 10 tickets for 50 cents we will still further increase patronage and thus give the people of Salem a fuller benefit of their street transportation system."

Single trip rides remain 7 cents.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Clifford will be greatly missed in Salem. They have been particularly active in the Salem Arts league.

Nine other troops were represented and there were a total of 133 scouts and 12 scoutmasters. Rev. Guy Drill preached a sermon on "Scout oath and law; When a scout is a good scout?" The scouts renewed their scout oath.

E. W. Kennedy is scoutmaster of troop four and had charge of plans for the event.

\$883,000 Allotted Oregon by R.F.C. For Relief Work

The loan of \$883,000 allotted to Oregon yesterday by the Reconstruction Finance corporation will be deposited in a central account and apportioned to 12 counties

upon the approval of applications by Governor Meler. Meler said the amounts that would be apportioned to the counties would depend upon the seriousness of their demands for relief. Counties destined to benefit under the loan include Union, Wallowa, Sherman, Douglas, Harney, Coos, Wasco, Clackamas, Baker, Deschutes, Multnomah and Lane.

SCOUT CRISIS TO BE CONSIDERED TONIGHT

Tonight at 8 o'clock at the chamber of commerce rooms there will be a gathering of citizens of this city, fathers and mothers of boys, business and professional men and others who are interested in the training and development of boys. The purpose of the meeting will be to find out the sentiment of the people toward continuance of boy scout work in Salem. C. C. Colt, Portland banker, member of the state board of higher education, and Portland leader in boy scout work, will be the speaker of the evening and give his ideas of the value of scouting.

Boy scout work in this area has reached a crisis. If it is to be continued it must have wider support. Deficits have been incurred for several years, and those who have carried the load must know what response to expect from the people.

The meeting tonight is not a money-raising meeting itself so much as a way of finding out what the public attitude toward scouting is. Clifford Irwin is chairman of the committee in charge of the arrangements. Irl S. McSherry is president of Cascade council.

Removal of Game Commissioners is Banned by Senate

The senate yesterday approved a bill introduced by Representative Graham prohibiting the removal of members of the state game commission during the term for which they were elected. Senator Staples opposed the measure on the ground that if the governor was authorized to appoint the members of the game commission he should have the power to remove them. It also was charged that the bill would result in building up a political machine.
