

FLAX SEED IS GRANGE TOPIC

Members at Silverton Plan To Plant for Sale to Portland Mills

SILVERTON, Feb. 27 — The growing of flax seed for the Portland mills was the important discussion up before grange members at the meeting of the Silverton order Friday night. The agricultural committee headed by Otto O. Dahl had made considerable investigation along this line.

Flax seed can be secured at three cents a pound it was reported and it takes 40 pounds to seed an acre. The average production of the seed is 10 bushels to the acre and last year the average price was \$1.18 1/4 cents a bushel. Half a dozen grange members designated their intention of growing the flax for seed this coming year.

The matter will be handled through the agricultural committee of the grange and distribution will be handled by George (Sealson) of the Warehouse Service corporation. Grange members who desire more information on this subject may secure it by seeing Mr. Sealson.

Local grange members who had been with the committee waited upon the county court Friday morning in regard to the replacing of butter for oleomargarine in the county institutions reported favorably.

From the Silverton grange were Theodore Hobart, master, Alfred Lee and George Ierselson, Ernest Warner and Silas Torvond, also of Silverton, were serving on the committee and these two represented the Farmer's Union.

Arthur Brown of Salem and A. A. Geer of Salem were the two speakers of the evening. Mr. Brown spoke on the deputy system of the grange and also on legislative measures. Mr. Geer spoke on the legislature.

Considerable time was spent at the meeting discussing various legislative measures. Perhaps strongest sentiment was expressed in the opposition to the sales tax, an opposition which had been expressed in resolutions at the January meeting of the grange.

"Our boys are learning whether their cows are producers or just boarders. A cow was a cow to us before. The boys are learning to repair farm machinery during the rainy days so that they can use it when the sun shines and not to leave it until they need it before fixing it, like most of us older farmers have done."

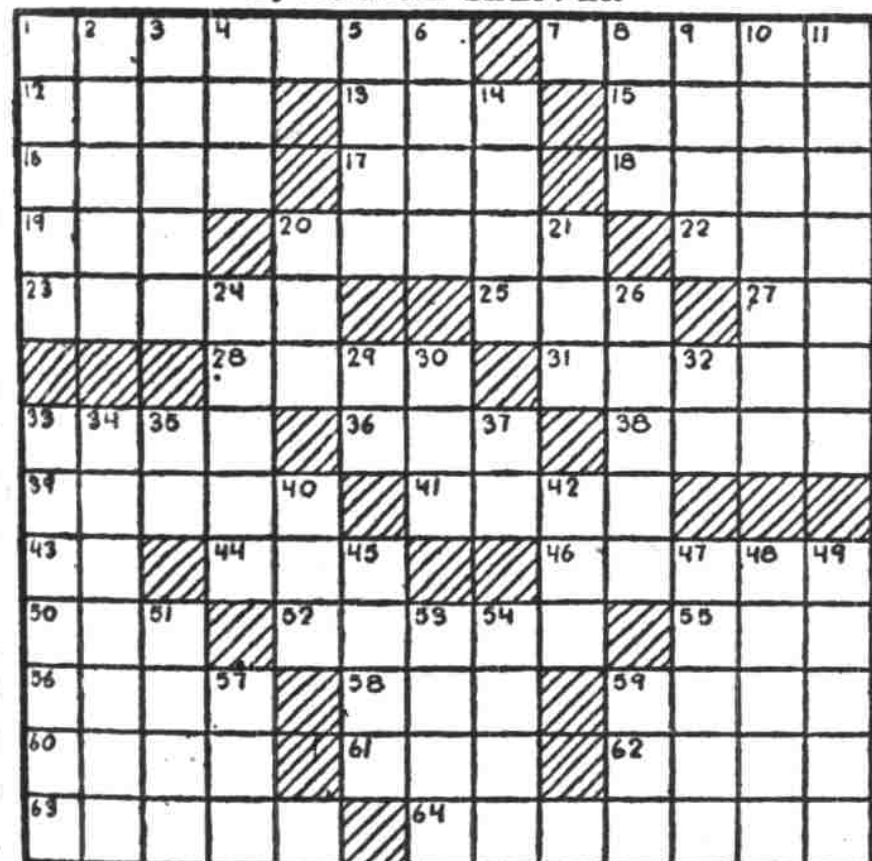

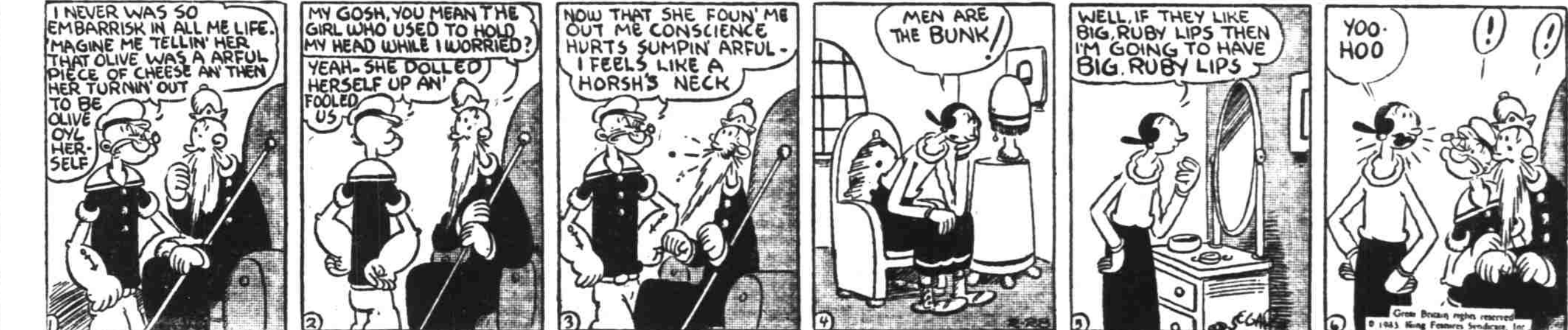
