demands on their funds to a small per cent of deposits, in most cases 5 per cent.

Maryland—Banking moratorium extended by gubernatorial proclamation pending enactment of stabilization measures.

State officials, dealing with banking affairs in Oregon, said at midnight that a conference would be held at the capital this morning to determine what steps will be taken in Oregon to meet new developments in the banking situation throughout the nation.

The state banking board and bank leaders are expected to attend the meeting.

Legislation to tie Oregon in with the Couzens measure which recently passed the United States congress has been talked this week at the statehouse but no measure has as yet been introduced.

Under the Couzens bill the comptroller of the treasury has power to limit bank withdrawals by depositors when enabling legislation is passed by the states.

Submission of such legislation is expected before the present session adjourns. Without it, only bank holidays can be resorted to in cases of stress. With such legislation enacted, bank business can be continued with a limit placed on withdrawals should the situation demand such restrictions.

Who shall receive the jobs available will be determined by Red Cross investigation, as one of the R. F. C. loan provisions is that funds shall be expended only after a careful check by the authorized agency. Rechecking from time to time is also promised.

It is believed that the word of the Marion county loan will be received within the next day or so.

The legal time for a legislative session is 60 days. Members yesterday finished the 52nd day of the regular session, serving their 12th consecutive day without pay.

General legislative costs, apart from clerk hire, approximate \$2000 a day. Members who came to Salem on an economy program were admittedly distressed yesterday when they reviewed legislative costs and anticipated constituents' criticism of the expense incurred by the legislators themselves.

The constitutionality of the proposed law as it relates to interstate commerce was questioned by Senator Strayer. "It is singular," he said, "that for many years the persons who are advocating the passage of this bill have attempted to secure the enactment of similar legislation by congress."

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ALL H. S. STUDENTS ARE GIVEN TB. TEST

At the conclusion of a tuberculosis clinic today, Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer, will have completed the testing of virtually all of the students at Salem high school for the presence of tuberculosis germs. He will be assisted by Dr. Grover C. Bellinger, superintendent of the Oregon state tuberculosis hospital, in reading tuberculosis tests administered Monday to 445 boys and girls.

Tuberculin testing on a large scale was instituted in the schools last year. Only those not tested last year are being examined at this time. Students showing positive reaction will be examined with the fluoroscope.

Due to reduction of tubercular cases and better care, the old belief that every person carries tuberculosis germs is becoming a myth, according to Dr. Douglas. In the senior high school, for instance, only 15 per cent of the students have been found to carry the germs, and in the junior high schools, only eight per cent.

SAYS RED UPRISING PLANNED, GERMANY

BERLIN, March 1—(AP)—Hermann Goering, minister without portfolio in the Hitler government, declared in a speech last night that the incendiary fire at the Reichstag building Monday night was meant to inaugurate a series of violent acts culminating in a communist revolution.

For this reason, he asserted, the government was justified in promulgating its drastic decrees of the last two days, which have greatly increased penalties for treason and have placed Germany under virtual martial law.

The cabinet minister said communists have spread handbills calling for the formation of groups for so-called self-protection but really intended to provoke civil war.

Short and Ugly Word Gets Huey Into Law Courts

WASHINGTON, March 1—(AP)—For having been called a scoundrel, crook and liar by Huey P. Long of Louisiana, on the senate floor, Brigadier General Samuel T. Ansell, retired, today sued the self-styled "kingfish" for \$500,000 damages.

Long had said he would waive congressional immunity for his remarks, but the senator, informed of the suit, said his waiver applied to Louisiana courts only.
