WHEAT DAMAGE SENDS PRICES UP BUTTER STRENGTH IS PRONOUNCED

Huge Abandonment of Winter Crops is Suggested

CHICAGO, March 1-(AP)-Suggestions of huge abandonment of damaged United States winter wheat acreage lifted grain prices late today, more than offsetting earlier market downturns.

One leading private crop expert, who issued an estimate ahead of the majority of unofficial summaries due tomorrow, indicated an abandonment of 6,257,000 acres of wheat in Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas. This would be about 28 per cent loss from the government forecast of

Dec. 1. Wheat closed firm at 1/2 off to up, compared with yesterday's finish, corn unchanged to 1/2 higher, oats varying from a shade decline to 1/8 advance.
