

Dallas and Corvallis Take Lead in District 11 Tourney

WILL CLASH IN MATINEE GAME

Polk Entry Beats Taft by 39-14, Philomath is Defeated 35-15

INDEPENDENCE, March 11—Dallas and Corvallis high school basketball teams, which had things all their own way in the opening games of the district 11 tournament here tonight, will meet Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock in a game which will go a long way toward settling the district championship and the right to enter the state tourney week after next.

The second game Friday afternoon will be between Philomath and Taft, losers in the opening games tonight. There will be no games Friday night. Saturday morning the loser of the Dallas-Corvallis game will play the winner of the Taft-Philomath game, and the winner of that morning game will play the winner of the Dallas-Corvallis game Saturday night. A final game may be necessary next Monday, under the double elimination system.

Attendance tonight was poor, Dallas having the biggest delegation. With Merryman and Noble leading the attack, Corvallis defeated Philomath 35 to 15, gaining a 10 to 2 margin in the first quarter and a 20 to 5 lead at the half, coasting in from there with all of Coach "Mush" Torson's men getting a chance to play.

Dallas also led all the way to defeat Taft 39 to 14, with Jones performing outstandingly for the Polk county entry. The Taft team was fairly speedy but missed a big percentage of shots. Dallas was ahead 25 to 6 at half time.

The first game will be played here tomorrow night and the second at Eugene Saturday night.

Emil Piluso of Portland was scheduled at the start of the season to officiate in the two games, but Oregon university athletic officials this week declared that a letter from Piluso requesting that another referee be named made the Portland man ineligible for the post.

ROBIN REED TO TACKLE LYNES

Chance of Comparison With Jones Upon "Straight" Wrestling Basis

Reed, now recovered from a stage of blood poisoning, will tangle with Ray Lyness, who this week gained his fourth consecutive victory over Jones.

The fans classified above assert that Robin would vanquish Henry any time, except that when the Utah man gets in a bad corner, he invariably quits wrestling and starts the rough stuff which prevents his opponent from wrestling as well.

Lyness on the other hand has appeared so far to be a fellow who waxes hostile only for retaliation purposes and is willing to wrestle any time his opponent will do the same. He has left no doubt of his ability to dish up the dirt if that becomes advisable.

It is no secret that Reed prefers clean wrestling, not so much because of any personal objections to hard knocks, but simply because of straight wrestling his speed is more of an asset. Chances are that he will stay conscientiously within the rules when he meets Lyness, and if the Vancouver man does likewise, they will be able to tussle to their hearts' content.

Reed has been resting at his Reedsport home, meanwhile paying more than usual personal attention to his newspaper, since last fall when he developed a severe case of blood poisoning due to contact with a rusty nail.

CURT COMMENTS

Asse Cornell has resigned as athletic coach at College of Idaho. Brief announcement of his resignation effective at the close of the present school year contains no hint of the reason. Possibly he has a better job in sight. Cornell's Coyotes have always been colorful, usually well up in the Northwest conference race, even at times when his materials were not impressive. They won the first football championship following the reorganization in 1926. The conference will miss Cornell.

The Salem high basketballers will play Silverton at Silverton Friday night, and they'll be distinct under-dogs. The game here early in the season was anybody's, right up to the end, but Silverton won it, and the big Foxes will have an added advantage on their home floor. We're not sure but that they would win on any floor, but that's a matter which may just possibly be settled at the state tournament, and we're not betting, one way or the other.

The trouble over Emil Piluso as referee for the big games at Corvallis Friday and at Eugene Saturday, seems to be that he asked to be relieved because there was so much booing at the first Oregon-Oregon State game in Eugene. He feels this endangered his reputation as an official. The head men at the university in return resent this attitude on Piluso's part, and refuse to have him officiate, even in the game at Corvallis.

The university bunch wrote a letter indicating that Ralph Coleman or anybody else would be acceptable, or no referee at all with a guarantee of the Webfoot's conduct on the floor. That's the Eugene angle. From Corvallis comes a declaration that the college bunch offered to have some disinterested parties pick the referee, and the university refused this arrangement.

It all sounds a bit childish, and no doubt will be settled before Friday night, possibly before you read this. We might

suggest a thoroughly capable man for the job, but suggestions we have tossed out free of charge recently haven't seemed to be lucky, so maybe the man we have in mind will keep a better chance if we have still.

If Stata Gill, et al, seem a bit particular in the matter, it may be because that first game was a bit rough, and because Ed Lewis, while a much more robust young man than in past years, still is not invulnerable. And there may be a couple of important games next week in which he will be needed.

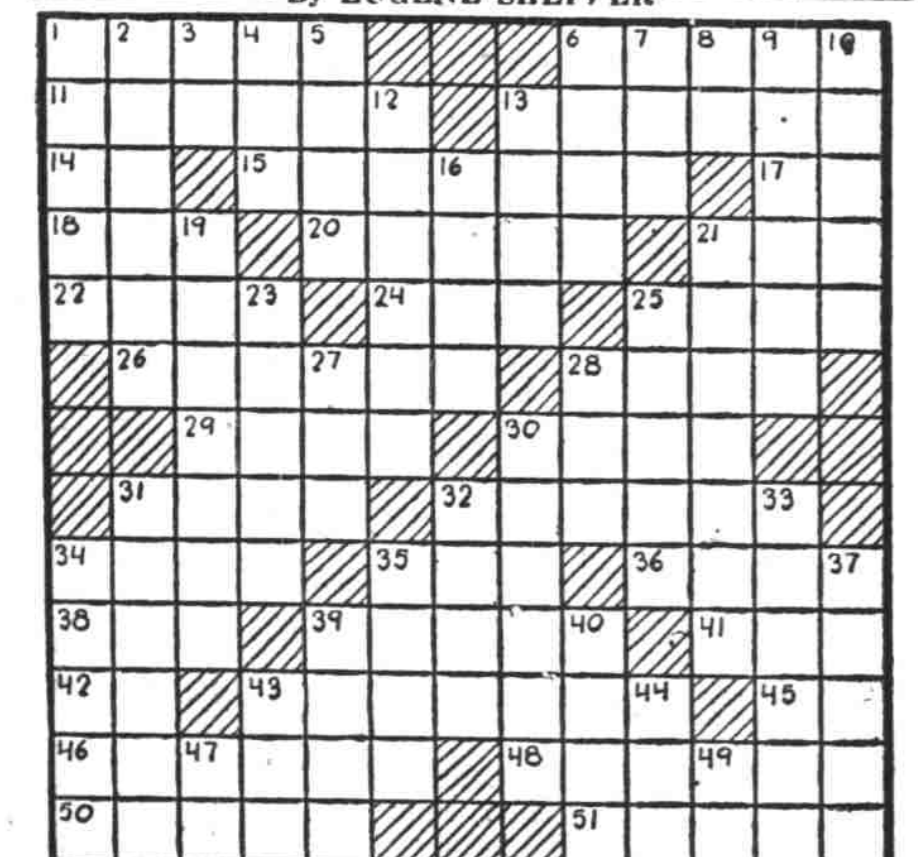
