

BANKERS MEET, AGREE ON BILL

Statements Stress Fact Oregon Institutions Entirely Sound

Schramm announced at noon Thursday that the banks now open were receiving deposits which were being dated as of March 6. These deposits are not being entered on the books of the institutions but are being held for safe keeping. Restricted withdrawals also were permitted. Outlined by Meier.

"On account of the prolonged depression and general adverse business conditions in the east the governors of more than 20 states have, during the past three weeks, declared holidays in order to protect business in general and bank deposits in particular," a statement issued by Governor Meier read:

"The governor of Michigan was the first to declare a holiday which is still in force and apparently will continue in force until certain reorganizations can be effected. The legislature in a number of eastern states have already passed special acts for the protection of bank depositors."

"During this period I have not found it either necessary or desirable to take any action in Oregon for so far as I know Oregon's banking institutions are in unusually good condition."

"The national congress has recently passed a law authorizing federal authorities to take action when and where required for the protection of bank depositors against incipient withdrawals or anything else which might undermine the stability of the banks of the country. Many of the eastern states are adopting similar legislation which apparently should be enacted in Oregon and elsewhere for the protection of the general public."

"Last night the governor of California declared a three day holiday. Owing to the intimate business relations with our sister states and the fact that our public and private affairs are so intermingled with and dependent upon our relations with states adjoining us, I felt it to be the part of wisdom to take the same action for the protection of our people and therefore issued a proclamation declaring a three-day holiday in Oregon."

"This action is not novel in Oregon as Governor Chamberlain, in the fall of 1907, declared a similar holiday extending over a period of months."

"I do not need to call attention to the fact that we are passing through one of the most difficult epochs in the history not only of Oregon but probably of the world, and on behalf of our commonwealth I urge our citizens to exercise that high degree of patriotism and sound judgment which has been one of the outstanding virtues of Oregon's citizens."
