SILVERTON, March 3.—Silverton friends have learned of the death of Ole G. Storaasli at Parkland, Wash., February 15, with his funeral at the Parkland Lutheran church on the 18th.

Mr. Storaasli was born December 4, 1862. The family moved to Silverton and lived here several years before moving to Parkdale, where he was actively identified with the early history of Pacific Lutheran college. He is remembered by many here. He is survived by the following sons and daughters: William of Parkdale, Gustave G. of Tacoma, Mrs. T. M. Daniels of Parkdale, Mrs. W. F.
